
On Monday, Sept. 1, in Kewaskum, several kids, along with their parents, hosted a lemonade stand to raise funds for the future Creekside Camp playground.

## Civil War Veterans Remembered At Van Vechten Cemetery

About 100 people gathered to honor three Civil War veterans at the Van Vechten (Union) Cemetery in the Town of Kewaskum on Saturday, Sept. 6.

Honored were Civil War veterans Friedrich (Fred) Kocher, Charles (Carl) Schuppel and Johann (John) Siegel. Dressed in Civil War uniforms, members of the Sons of the Union Veterans of the Civil War stood beside the graves of each of the Civil War veterans during the ceremony. Family members of each of the veterans were present at the event.

“Today we are here to recognize and honor our comrades who served in the Civil War. This has been an ongoing project for us, to ensure that we do not forget the soldiers who served during the Civil War,” said Richard Lindbeck, a member of the committee dedicated to remembering Civil War veterans in Washington County.

Many of the headstones or grave markers of our Civil War veterans are deteriorating or are no longer legible, so, the committee’s goal is to place a monument at each of the cemeteries in Washington County that has a Civil War veteran, so they won’t be forgotten. The monuments are paid for by donations from local businesses, community organizations, as well as individual donations. No tax dollars are used, and the committee members donate their time.

On Saturday, there was a three-round volley gun salute by the West Bend Veterans Honor Guard, and Cpl. Dominic Johann of the U.S. Marines presented a wreath. The following Civil War soldiers were recognized:

- Charles (Carl) Schuppel—Carl Schuppel was born October 3, 1841, in Kirchheim, Baden, Germany and immigrated to the United States at



## The Difference We Make: Finding Purpose in Our Finite Time

Dear Reader,

We all want to make a difference. It's perhaps the most universal human drive—this need to matter, to leave something meaningful behind, to know that our brief time here counted for something. But as I've watched colleagues, friends, and family members grapple with this fundamental question, I've come to understand that the premise itself reveals a profound truth: we all do make a difference. The only question is what kind.



lives overnight but to infuse our ordinary moments with intentional goodness. It's about choosing, again and again, to be agents of connection rather than division, healing rather than harm, hope rather than despair.

This brings us to perhaps the most profound question: What happens after we've shared our gifts? What lies beyond our time here?

While I respect that people hold varying beliefs about afterlife and eternity, I find deep meaning in the possibility that love—genuine, selfless love—connects us to something larger than our individual existence. Whether you conceive of this as God, as the interconnectedness of all life, or as the enduring impact of our choices on future generations, there's something profoundly hopeful in the idea that our capacity for love transcends our biological limitations.

Some dedicate their lives to healing—doctors working through pandemics, teachers nurturing young minds, volunteers serving in soup kitchens. Others choose paths that diminish rather than elevate: leaders who exploit trust, corporations that prioritize profit over people's well-being, individuals who spread division rather than understanding. The difference we make isn't neutral; it tilts the world toward light or darkness.

Death, whether it arrives through illness, accident, or simply the passage of time, serves as life's great editor. It forces us to distinguish between what matters and what merely occupies our time. It asks us: What are you doing with the gift of consciousness you've been given?

So how do we ensure our difference is meaningful? The answer lies in recognizing and sharing our unique gifts

—those particular combinations of talents, perspectives, and opportunities that only we possess.

Meaningful impact doesn't require grand gestures or public recognition. It requires attention—to the needs around us and to the particular ways we're equipped to meet them.

Of course, recognizing this is easier than living it. Every day presents challenges that can overwhelm our best intentions. Work pressures, family obligations, financial stress, health concerns—these realities can make us feel more like survivors than world-changers. Some mornings, just getting through feels like victory enough.

But what if we reframed these everyday struggles? What if we saw them not as obstacles to meaning-making but as the very contexts where meaning gets made? The parent who shows up tired but loving to their child's school play. The employee who treats difficult customers with patience and respect. The neighbor who shovels an elderly person's walkway without being asked. These small acts of care accumulate into something larger than themselves.

The challenge isn't to transform our entire

This isn't wishful thinking but practical wisdom. When we live as though love is eternal—when we act as though kindness, justice, and compassion have lasting significance—we create the kind of world where such ideals can flourish. We become co-creators of the "utopian world" not through naive optimism but through deliberate, sustained commitment to our highest values.

Every morning, we face the same fundamental choice: Will we use our gifts to add light to the world or to dim it? Will we contribute to the sum total of human flourishing or detract from it?

The beautiful and terrifying truth is that this choice is always ours to make. No one else can live our particular life or offer our specific gifts. No one else occupies our exact position in the web of relationships and opportunities that surrounds us.

This is both responsibility and privilege. In a world that often feels chaotic and beyond our control, we retain the power to determine what kind of difference we make. We can choose to see each day not as a challenge to endure but as an opportunity to contribute something meaningful to the great human project of building a more loving world.

The question isn't whether we'll make a difference—we will, inevitably. The question is what kind of difference it will be, and whether we'll recognize it as the profound privilege it truly is.

# CoCoRaHS Seeks Volunteer Weather Observers in Washington and Ozaukee Counties

Do you enjoy watching the weather? The Community Collaborative Rain, Hail and Snow Network (CoCoRaHS) is seeking new volunteer observers in Washington and Ozaukee Counties.

In Washington County, observers are especially needed in Addison, Erin, and Wayne Townships, as well as the Villages of Germantown and Richfield, and areas near Cedar Creek and the Milwaukee River. In Ozaukee County, additional observers are needed in areas near Cedar and Sauk Creeks, and the Milwaukee River.

CoCoRaHS is a nationwide volunteer network of backyard weather observers who measure and report daily precipitation. Their data supports the National Weather Service, emergency managers, farmers, researchers, and others who

rely on accurate, localized weather information.

"All you need is a CoCoRaHS approved 4-inch diameter rain gauge, a little training, and a few minutes each day," said Thom Thomson, CoCoRaHS County Coordinator for Washington and Ozaukee Counties. "Your reports help fill in the gaps between official weather stations and provide valuable data for our communities."

Anyone interested in weather — from farmers and gardeners to teachers, students, and enthusiasts — is encouraged to join. Observers submit their daily reports online at [www.CoCoRaHS.org](http://www.CoCoRaHS.org).

age 10. Charles was a shoemaker in the Town of Barton when he volunteered to serve in the Union Army in September 1861. He enlisted as a private in the 4th Battery, Wisconsin Light Artillery, at Camp Utley in Racine. He was 5 feet 5 inches tall with a dark complexion and black hair. The Battery fired the gun “The Union” during the battle between the Monitor and Merrimac. It participated in the Siege of Suffolk and Petersburg. Schuppel served until Oct. 4, 1864, and was honorably discharged at Jones Landing, Virginia. After being discharged, he moved to Sangamon County, Ill., where he became a farmer, married Abbie Buckingham and raised six children. The date of his death is still being researched.

• Friedrich (Fred) Kocher—Friedrich Kocher was born in Kirchheim, Baden, Germany, on Sept. 14, 1839, and came to the United States in December 1848. He was a sandy-haired blue-eyed man, 5 foot, 4 inches tall, when he volunteered to serve in the Union Army. He was a private in the 2nd Independent Battery, Wisconsin Light Artillery, taking part in the Siege of Suffolk and Dix’s Peninsula Campaign. He was mustered out in at Point Lookout, Maryland, on July 10, 1865. In November 1866, he married Augusta Wernicke in the town of Addison. They raised 12 children and farmed in the Kewaskum area, until he died at age 67 from cancer on June 12, 1907.

• Johann (John) Siegel—Johann Siegel was born on Feb. 21, 1826, in Saxony, Germany. At age 28, he immigrated to the United States and settled in the Town of Fillmore. He married Wilhelmina Schmidt (nee Seefeld) in 1864, settling in Kewaskum. John’s wife, Wilhelmina, was married once before. Her first husband, Peter Schmidt, of Kewaskum, enlisted in the Union Army in 1862 and died of disease in Arkansas in 1863, and was buried in Little Rock National Cemetery. On Dec. 23, 1864, John Siegel enlisted in Company F, 18th Wisconsin Infantry, organized in Milwaukee. The 18th participated in the advance on Richmond and the surrender of the Confederate Army. The regiment moved to Louisville, Kentucky, where it was mustered out on July 18, 1865. Two years later, he and Wilhelmina had their first of seven children. John died from heart trouble on Dec. 18, 1913, in the Town of Barton. He was 87.

The Van Vechten Cemetery is located at 8446 Highland Drive in the Town of Kewaskum. The cemetery was established by the Van Vechten family in 1851. It was at the suggestion of Jacob T. Van Vechten, who served as town chairman and county supervisor, that the town was named Kewaskum, in honor of Chief Kewaskum, a Potawatomi Indian chief who once lived in the area.

The Civil War Monument at Van Vechten Cemetery was donated in memory of Russell Oelhafen. For more information or to donate to create a lasting memory of Civil War veterans, visit rocvv.org.





goose hunting to pass the time.

**Monday, September 1**  
**High 75, Low 53**

As any bear baiter that has been running baits since April 25 can tell you, we are long-term tired and very excited. We run a 40-mile round trip from my house and four hikes into our stumps, and it is a lot of work. In the 16 years I have been doing this, this summer has been incredible for baits being hit almost every time we check them and by big bear.

As luck would have it, last week all of our baits but one had a complete shutdown and that is due to lots of berries, mushrooms and acorns, new food. After running the baits today, we headed out with my canoe and Red for an afternoon of goose and teal hunting as it was opening day.

Doug and I have been friends all of our lives, and now that we are both in our mid 60s we have hit a point where if we do not fire the gun we really do not care and that is a good thing because despite a solid effort and seeing hundreds of wood duck and mallards we did not get a shot at a teal or a goose. We sure did see a pretty sunset, and it was good to be in a canoe together.

Until this summer, I have not put a solid effort into training Red on waterfowl. Her mother was an excellent retriever, and when Michelle passed away three years ago, Red was a pup, and I simply have not had it in me to do the training. Now that my pond is complete, Red loves it when I pull out

the dummies and we play fetch.

This spring, when we started running the baits, first, it was ticks and black flies. I actually have had 12 ticks embedded into me this warm season, and I am hoping there will be no problems with that down the road. Once May came around, we did regular battle with mosquitoes and deer flies, and this was a tough year for deer flies. One day I made a mistake and forgot mosquito spray, and I ran the baits in shorts, sandals and a tank top. I was bitten so many times by deer flies that I actually became sick for a day.


The annual fall insect that can be very hard on bear baiters is hornets and ground bees. On Saturday of this week, I brought a portable stand to one of our hunting locations and unknowingly threw it on top of the entrance to a ground bee nest. I was attacked and luckily only stung once, but let me tell you, if I get stung more than once by a hornet or a bee, I have some pretty serious problems for about a week.

The next morning, Doug and I did another waterfowl hunt to a different location and once again did not fire a shot. It seems like where we are hunting there are not many teal, and though there were geese all summer, they seem to have vanished, and that brought us to one day and bear season opens. My buddy had his knee replaced in January, so he would be in shape for this hunt. We have probably dropped \$800 on bait, the same on gas and countless hours in the woods.

I feel that "all season" bear baiters become biologists in a way; we are in the woods from spring until well into the fall. We watch the wolf, deer, insects, waterfowl, and green up to the leaves falling, and we hope that when we are sitting in a tree, when the season opens, the magnificent animal called a black bear will offer us a shot. In our case, just like not firing our guns during the waterfowl hunts, we are well aware that if we do not get a chance to harvest a bear, everything will be ok and the sun will still come up in the morning.

Love this way of life!
