Campbellsport Football Goes Lights Out against the Orioles with Homecoming Win

On September 26, Campbellsport football beat North Fond du Lac (NFDL) 63-8 in their first Flyway Conference win on homecoming.

Campbellsport (2-4, 1-3) recovered a surprise opening onside kick from NFDL (0-6, 0-4) to start the game at the 50-yard line.

Blake Heltemes burst through the offensive line into the Orioles' second level of defenders and sprinted into the end zone to give the Cougars an early jolt of excitement and a 7-0 lead with 11:14 in the first quarter.

"It was good to come out and get the offense going early," said Head Coach Todd Wondra.

NFDL converted two first downs on their first offensive drive before the Cougars stopped the Orioles on fourth down, highlighted by a Pierce Kaehne three-yard tackle for a loss.

The Cougars converted four first downs from the running game before Heltemes capped the 70-yard drive with a 23-yard rushing touchdown to give Campbellsport a 14-0 lead with 44 seconds left in the first quarter.

"Blake is a special athlete and leaves nothing in the tank when the game is over, and is important to us on both sides of the ball," said Wondra. "He runs hard and at times is looking for contact."

Kaehne intercepted the NFDL quarterback on fourth down on the next Orioles' drive to give the Cougars the ball back at their own 49-yard line.

Campbellsport received another big play from Kaehne when he broke through some NFDL tacklers and spun around while maintaining his balance and vision to sprint down in front of the Cougars' sideline for an electrifying 51-yard rushing touchdown to increase Campbellsport's lead to 21-0 with 9:59 on the second-quarter clock.

"Getting Pierce back is big for us," said Wondra. "He is a great athlete, and you need those kids on the field as much as possible."

The two teams traded possessions before Heltemes blocked a NFDL punt, which was recovered by Cullen Reis and returned to the Orioles' 23-yard line for the Cougars.

Chris Taddey went up the middle of the defense and went untouched by weaving through their entire Orioles' defense for a 23-yard rushing touchdown on the first play after the blocked punt to expand the Cougars' lead to 28-0 at the 4:27 mark in the second quarter.

Heltemes blocked another punt for the Cou-

gars, with additional pressure on the punt coming from Keagan Sabish, and the ball was recovered by Braden Ebert at the Orioles' 20-yard line.

The Cougars got a second rushing touchdown from Taddey on a one-yard rushing touchdown to put the Campbellsport lead at 34-0 with 2:18 left in the first half.

The first half ended when Heltemes blitzed from his linebacker spot to sack the Orioles' quarterback to send the teams to their locker rooms at halftime.

NFDL's rough night continued when the Orioles fumbled the opening second-half kickoff, giving the ball to the Cougars at the NFDL 30-yard line.

Campbellsport got a 16-yard passing touchdown from quarterback Jackson Straub to Reis,

Lightning Strike Kills Wisconsin DNR Employee

On September 25, the Washington County Sheriff's Office put out a press release stating that a Wisconsin DNR employee was killed by a lightning strike on September 22. The Washington County Sheriff's Office, along with the Kewaskum Fire Department, was requested to assist the Wisconsin DNR and Fond du Lac authorities in a search on Monday evening.

The Wisconsin DNR and Fond du Lac County authorities worked to locate Adam Zirbel, 48, with the search beginning at his vehicle, then heading to the Washington County and Fond du Lac County line. Zirbel was found deceased around 7:40 p.m. in the Town of Kewaskum, and after further investigation, it was confirmed to have been from a lightning strike. According to the Sheriff's Office's press release, there had been a documented lightning strike around 10:15 a.m. that morning.

Washington County Sheriff Martin Schulties extended his condolences and prayers to the victim's family, saying, "Adam dedicated his life to the service of others as a father, husband, community leader, and DNR forester. We are better off because of Adam's contributions to society, and he will be missed by many. He died performing a civil service to the people of Wisconsin, and for that, we are all forever grateful for his service."

Speed Study May Result in Raised Speed Limits Near Campbellsport Middle/High School

At the Campbellsport School Board meeting on Monday, September 22, the Safety and Transportation Committee shared the results of a speed study conducted by Fond du Lac County on County Roads V and W.

"They did [the study] in June, so they didn't do it in peak time," explained committee and board member Debby Flasch. "When they did it, the speeds were more than what the posted speed limit was, so their solution was to increase the speed limit."

District Administrator Tom Wissink and Police Chief Andrea Dowland attended the Fond du Lac County Traffic Safety Commission meeting, where the methodology of the study was discussed.

"They take the speed people are going. If they're speeding, they call it 'taking into consideration what the drivers feel the speed limit should be there naturally,'" said Wissink. "They use a percentage: 85%."

"In both cases, it didn't make a difference what the posted speed limit was," added Clerk Jim Ninnemann. "The 15th percentile was 4 mph or 5 mph over the speed limit. The 85th percentile was 10 mph over. That's why they recommended raising it by five in both spots, . . . which means people will just go another 5 mph higher."

The speed limit near the school currently is 25 mph. The speed study suggested raising it to 30 mph.

At the county commission meeting, Wissink raised his concerns about the potential speed increase:



Finding the Sacred Within the Mundane

Dear Reader,

We spend remarkable portions of our lives in what feels like maintenance mode—shopping, preparing meals, doing laundry, commuting to work. It's easy to feel like we're treading water, that all this basic upkeep somehow keeps us from "real" living. But what if this feeling represents a fundamental misunderstanding of where meaning actually resides?



enment doesn't happen despite mundane activities—it happens through them. There's a famous saying: "Before enlightenment, chop wood, carry water. After enlightenment, chop wood, carry water." The extraordinary doesn't replace the ordinary; it reveals itself within it.

The key lies in what we might call "awakened attention"—a quality of presence that transforms not what we do, but how we do it. When we wash dishes with awakened attention, we feel the temperature of the water, notice the play of light on soap bubbles, experience the satisfaction of transforming something dirty into something clean. We become aware of our hands moving, our breath flowing, our mind's tendency to drift to past and future.

This isn't about making dishwashing "special" by adding spiritual concepts to it. It's about discovering the aliveness already present in the activity when we show up fully to it. The water is actually warm. The soap actually smells like lemon. Our hands actually feel the smooth surface of the plate.

This transformation requires no special training, no particular beliefs, no exotic practices. It requires only the radical act of paying attention to what's actually happening right now, in the middle of whatever ordinary thing we're doing. In that attention, the mundane reveals itself as miraculous, the necessary becomes meaningful, and maintenance becomes a form of prayer.

The great philosophical traditions have long grappled with this tension between the mundane and the transcendent. The Roman Stoic Marcus Aurelius in his foundational book *Meditations* found profound significance in recognizing how even basic maintenance tasks connect us to the larger order of existence. When we eat, we participate in an ancient cosmic cycle of energy transformation. When we rest, we align ourselves with natural rhythms that govern everything from cellular repair to planetary rotation.

Twentieth-century existentialists like Albert Camus approached this differently but arrived at equally provocative insights. Camus saw the apparent absurdity of spending so much time on survival needs as precisely what makes human consciousness remarkable. We may be the only beings aware enough to notice this absurdity, which paradoxically gives us the freedom to create meaning despite—or perhaps because of—it.

Buddhist philosophy offers perhaps the most radical reframe of all. In Zen tradition, enlight-

C.P.L. Presents Badger Talk on The Wreck of the Edmund Fitzgerald – The Ship, the Storm and the Song

The Campbellsport Public library will host a Badger Talk by University of Wisconsin Madison Professor Emeritus Steve Ackerman on October 14, beginning at 6 p.m. Ackerman will explore the wreck of the Edmund Fitzgerald from perspectives of the weather, the ship, and the song by Gordon Lightfoot.

The event will take place in the basement of The Campbellsport Public Library at 220 N. Helena St. in Campbellsport and is free and open to the public. If entering after 6 p.m., please use the red door located by the flagpole to enter the building. You can gain access to the stairs and elevator through those doors.

Ackerman moved to Wisconsin in 1987, accepting a research scientist position in the Space Science and Engineering Center (SSEC). He joined the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Atmospheric and Oceanic Sciences in 1992. Professor Ackerman served as director of the Cooperative Institute for Meteorological Satellite Studies (CIMSS) from 1999-2019. This research organization is a collaboration between the UW-Madison, and The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Adminis-

tration (NOAA). Wisconsin is widely recognized as the birthplace of weather satellites, and CIMSS is key to Wisconsin's current reputation. He, along with Professor Jonathan Martin, is one of the "weather guys," who appear monthly on Wisconsin Public Radio to discuss the weather and climate. They also write a weekly blog (wxguys.ssec.wisc.edu/) and a column for the Wisconsin State Journal which answer people's weather questions.

Badger Talks reflects our tradition of the Wisconsin Idea — to extend the resources of the university to citizens of the state. More than 200 Badger Talks are hosted around the state each year, featuring faculty and staff with expertise in a variety of disciplines. Talk topics range from cutting edge discoveries to happiness in the workplace and everything in between. 

Doug's Bear

Hello friends,

This week's column is a bit different but very much about life through an outdoorsman's eyes. As many of you know, I lost Michelle Chiaro on June 15, 2022. If there is a definition of a soul-mate, Michelle and I hit the grand slam and found each other. Simply put, we rocked no matter what we did; our interests were the same, and we were very attracted to each other.

Michelle's favorite outdoor sport was bear hunting and anything to do with it. In early March of 2022, Michelle and I went exploring the frozen marshes of The Meadow Valley Wildlife Area, as I had an idea for an area where I had seen a lot of bear sign the fall before on a duck hunt. We struck gold and found a peaceful spot near a large marsh, and when April came along, we started baiting it and had bear almost on day one.

In late May, Michelle and I even camped in the area for a night just to sleep in the woods and run the baits; obviously, neither of us had a clue that Michelle would pass away in less than three weeks.

Michelle was Native American and closer to the earth than anyone I have ever met. She was also a big believer in dragonflies and that they are messengers from deceased loved ones. I have to tell you, this is extremely hard for me to write this week's column.

Doug Cibulka has been a good friend of mine since we were young boys and has been a part of our deer camp since the 80s. Doug and I have fished out of a canoe together on Lake Michigan, trapped with his son Derek for many years and have been bear hunting partners for about ten years.

Doug recently retired from his job at the UW Hospital in Madison. Though he had a tag this year, he has made it clear that this would be his last year as a bear hunter. The drive from Portage for five months is just too time-consuming and that is understandable.



Northern Juneau County is about as far south as you can go in Wisconsin for quality black bear hunting.

This summer was our most active bear baiting season since I started the baits in 2010. Simply put, lots of large, daytime bear, so many big bear, so often that we just quit talking about them and took turns running the baits.

About seven days before bear season opened, at least for Doug and me, someone flipped the light switch, and we had no more bear, except for one very hot bait that had two large bear, but always after dark.

Doug stayed at my house, "Bear Camp," for eight days when the season started, and neither of us came close to any action. After that, Doug went home, I hunted for three more days, and went on a fishing trip, and to my good friend Chuck Rieb's celebration of life.

I think I should say this, Doug and Michelle were very close and all baiting season Doug said he was going to kill a bear at "Michelle's Bait" as we call it. About the time that I was giving the final toast to Chuck Rieb at a very well-attended event, Doug had a dragonfly land on a branch next to him and sit there with him for a long period of time. Moments later, Doug heard something com-

Doug's aim was true, and even though I was not there, we had a bear. When Doug called me and told his story, it hit me so hard I had to get off the phone.

I am sure that there are people that think I have gone loco but knowing the love that woman had for Doug, bear and bear hunting, I guarantee you that she was a part of that hunt.

She was the best!





Turn off portable heaters whenever you leave a room or go to sleep.

Never leave a candle burning unattended, and consider replacing traditional candles with battery-operated flameless versions.

Replace or repair loose plugs, exposed wiring or frayed extension cords, and avoid overloading outlets and extension cords.

Keep any items that can catch fire at least three feet away from cooking and heating devices.

Remain in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food. Always turn off the stove if you leave the kitchen even for a brief period of time.

STAY ALIVE

In the event of a fire, yell "Fire" repeatedly and evacuate immediately. Once outside, call 911 or the fire department, and never reenter a burning building for any reason.

If a door or door handle feels warm to the touch, do not open it. Use an alternate escape route.

If you must walk through smoke, get as close to the ground as possible to escape under the smoke, closing doors behind you.

If your clothing catches fire, always remember to stop, drop and roll, covering your face with your hands.

If you can't escape a room, close the door and cover vents and door cracks with a towel or cloth to keep out smoke. Call 911 or the fire department, and signal for help at the window with a piece of cloth or a flashlight.

If you are unable to reach pets or someone in the home needing assistance, evacuate, call 911 and tell the emergency operator and firefighters where the person or pet is located.

“I said, ‘When you’re coming in[to the village], you’re going past the high school. There’s a hill there. It’s a really quick [change] from 55 mph to 25 mph, and you’re right on top of the school. We have traffic. We have kids who walk home. We have golf that walks across the street. There’s a daycare across the street. [The study] is not accounting for winter.’”

Wissink told the board the commission’s response to his statement was similar to, “‘Well, most people think it feels like they should be going 35 mph.’”

The speed study must be reviewed by two county committees before the decision to raise the speed limit can be made.

“If we have a chance of keeping it where it is to try and keep safety for our students, we’re going to have to contact these committee members,” said School Board President Mike Weiss.

“Get a tracking on concerns that have already been brought up with crossing guards,” suggested school board member Keith Peters. “With an increase that will get better? I bet not.”

The school board does not yet know when the second committee meeting will be held or which committee will be reviewing it. Flasch informed the board that Chief Dowland is working on securing that information and plans to attend the meeting.

“If she’s planning on going, I would like to know about it so that any of us can attend and help support Chief Dowland,” stated President Weiss. “I’d sure like to be there to advocate for safety.”

In addition to being physically present at the meeting, the school board plans to contact county committee members to oppose the potential increase.

“If every board member emailed every person on that committee, I don’t know if it will change their mind, but it will at least get their attention,” said Wissink.

Board Matters:

The school board discussed providing business recognition to Michels Corporation for donating \$6,500 for updated Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs). A motion to put a Michels sticker on the AED cabinets as recognition was made by Vice President Sharon Gazzola and passed unanimously.
