Campbellsport's Garrett Pickering Finishes on the State Cross Country Podium

On November 1, the Campbellsport boys' cross country team finished in ninth place with 210 points in Division 2 at the state cross country meet at Ridges Golf Course in Wisconsin Rapids.

Garrett Pickering reached the podium for the Cougars with a seventh-place finish, clocking in at 16:06, and Caleb Siebauer came in 24th place with a time of 16:39, helping pace Campbellsport in their third straight state appearance.

"The boys were ranked tenth going into the meet and ended up finishing in ninth place," said Head Coach Mike Kulibert.

How does it feel to reach the state cross country meet for the third straight year?

"It's very rewarding to make it because of how hard the team works," said Noah Bobb. "It's very cool to have made it every season since my sophomore year."

"This is my first year competing at state, and I am very proud of myself for making it," said Lincoln St. Louis.

"It is my first year, and it is exciting to go [and be] able to tell everyone I made it to state," said Kyle Allickson.

"I'm excited since I've never competed at state,

Village Administrator Charlie Kudy to Step Down in Campbellsport

Village Administrator Charlie Kudy will leave his post later this month, concluding a tenure marked by significant growth and development in Campbellsport.

Kudy, who has served as administrator since 2020, said his decision to step down was not an easy one. "Campbellsport has become my home and I am very proud of the progress and work we have been able to do as a community," Kudy said. "The right opportunity and the right time have presented themselves to make a change in my path and allow a new leader to organize and empower the staff."

During his time in office, Campbellsport saw a 16% increase in housing stock, large-scale public investments, and an influx of new businesses. The village's overall property value grew from around \$120 million to more than \$205 million, allowing for the highest levels of public investment in its history, Kudy said. More than \$10 million has been invested in infrastructure since 2022, including the resurfacing or reconstruction of 15% of all public roadways and major improvements to Fireman's Park.

Kudy also highlighted the village's success in securing approximately \$2.2 million in grants from state, federal, and local sources, offsetting the need for tax or rate increases. The Main Street business district welcomed eight new small businesses, and the community collaborated with regional partners to create the WRNC Small Business Fund, focused on helping Campbellsport entrepreneurs start and expand their businesses.

Kudy said he is proud of the relationships he built with local organizations, including the Campbellsport Area Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club, and emphasized the importance of community involvement. "The support for our village's progress has been amazing, and I am hopeful that it will continue into the future," he said.

As for challenges, Kudy cited the normal ups and downs of staffing changes and the importance of collaboration.

"With all challenges, I found it best to lean on my fellow Campbellsport community members, coworkers, and community partners for help, advice, and advocacy," he said.

Kudy's last day will be Nov. 21. Jessica Wildes, partner at Innovative Public Advisors and former assistant city administrator for the City of West Bend, will serve as interim administrator starting Nov. 17.

Kudy said he leaves behind robust transition

Kewaskum School District Board of Education Approves 2025-26 Budget

The Kewaskum School District Board of Education has approved the 2025-26 school year budget, totaling \$33,977,117, an increase of 3.43% over the prior year. The approved budget includes a total tax levy of \$13,877,189, which will support student programming, facility maintenance, and district operations.

Although the district's expenditures are projected to increase by less than 3.5%, the overall property tax levy will rise at a significantly higher rate. This is due primarily to state policy decisions that have frozen general school aid through 2027, meaning that school districts statewide must rely more heavily on local taxpayers to fund even modest operational increases.

"The higher levy doesn't reflect new or excessive spending," said Jim Leister, President of the Kewaskum Board of Education. "It's a reflection of how state funding formulas are structured. With state aid frozen, local property taxpayers are being asked to carry a larger share of what it costs to educate our students."

Under the 2025-27 Wisconsin state budget,

school districts are allowed to raise their revenue limits by \$325 per student in each of the next two years, but no additional state aid was provided to offset that increase. As a result, most Wisconsin districts, including Kewaskum, will see higher property tax levies even though their total expenditures are growing modestly.

"For taxpayers, this can be confusing," explained Dr. Mark Bazata, Superintendent of the Kewaskum School District. "When people see a levy increase of 10.8% while spending only rises by less than 3%, it's natural to wonder why. The answer lies in how the state's equalization formula and aid freeze interact with local property values and student enrollment. The local levy is going up simply to maintain services, not to expand them."

Another factor impacting this year's property tax levy is an increase in the private school voucher tax by 20%. This portion of the levy is mandated by the state to fund the private schools



Campbellsport School District Sets Tax Levy and Mill Rate

The Campbellsport School District held its Annual Meeting and Budget Hearing on Monday, October 27, to approve the 2025-2026 budget and tax levy.

The proposed tax levy for the 2025-2026 fiscal year was \$9,693,553. Last year, the tax levy was \$8,953,009.

"Basically, what we're seeing is an 8.27% increase in the property tax portion of the budget," explained Director of Business Services Kent Ritchie. "About 5% of that is coming off the fact that [some funds] that were allocated by the legislature . . . were put all to the property tax side."

"The rest of what we're seeing is that we have slightly declining enrollment along with vouchers and just the overall formula," Ritchie continued. "Since they didn't increase the equalization pool in Madison and Wisconsin . . . whoever spends more money be[comes] a slightly larger percentage of who gets the money."

The proposed mill rate was \$6.06 per \$1000 of equalized valuation, a 1.06% increase from last year.

The present members of the School District of Campbellsport electorate unanimously voted to approve the proposed tax levy and mill rate for the 2025-2026 fiscal year.

Annual Meeting Matters:

- The electorate considered approving pro-

posed school board salaries of "\$2,450 for the president, vice-president, clerk and treasurer and non-officer members at \$2,050 per year." A motion was made by an elector to increase the salaries by \$100, which passed unanimously.

- The electorate also unanimously voted to approve reimbursing board members' expenses "when traveling in the performance of duties" and for "loss of earnings when duties require the school board member to be absent from regular employment."

- Before adjourning, the electorate scheduled the next Annual Meeting for Monday, October 26, 2026.

A regular Campbellsport School Board meeting followed the Budget Hearing and Annual Meeting.

School Board Matters:

- The school board discussed approving Campbellsport High School early graduation applications. A motion to approve all applications was made by President Mike Weiss and passed unanimously.

- The school board also considered approving the 2025-2026 final budget. Keith Peters made the motion to approve the budget, which passed unanimously.

- Additionally, the school board discussed approving the 2025-2026 school tax levy. The motion to approve the mill rate of \$6.06 per \$1000 of equalized valuation was made by Vice President Sharon Gazzola and passed unanimously.

Community Call to Action – Supporting Our Neighbors During the SNAP Interruption

The Chief Health & Human Services Officer for Washington County Health & Human Services Julie Driscoll issued the following Call to Action on October 31:

“Due to the current federal government shutdown, FoodShare (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, or SNAP) benefits will not be accessible to recipients beginning November 1.

“In Washington County, this means more than 7,000 of our friends, neighbors, and families will face serious challenges putting food on the table. Each month, roughly \$1.1 million in benefits help feed local residents – 2,700 of them children, and more than half are elderly, blind, or living with disabilities.

“Local food pantries are already seeing increased need – up 20% this year alone. In September, for example, Full Shelf Pantry in West Bend served 1,200 clients, including 450 families, before the SNAP suspension even began.

“Washington County has always shown up for one another in hard times. Now is the moment to do it again. We are asking individuals, businesses, faith organizations, and nonprofits to help spread the word and support our local food pantries. If you are able, please consider:

- Donating a bag of groceries or making a financial contribution to a local pantry.
- Organizing a food drive in

St. Lucas Lutheran Church to Dedicate New Building on November 16

Members of St. Lucas Evangelical Lutheran Church in Kewaskum are excited to announce the completion of their new church building. A Dedication Service will be held on Sunday, Nov. 16, at 9:30 a.m. Two days later, the congregation will host an Open House for community members to tour the new building on Tuesday, Nov. 18, from 6-8 a.m. Final services in the old church building will take place on Saturday, Nov. 8, at 6 p.m., and on Sunday, Nov. 9 at 9:30 a.m.


The new church building features improved accessibility. The sanctuary is built with no steps or ramp for worshipers to navigate to enter. Restrooms are located on the same level as the worship area. This is a big change from the old church building, which had 11 steps up to the sanctuary from the sidewalk, and 17 steps down to the restrooms in the basement. The church will feature state of the art hearing assistance so that everyone will be able to hear the message of Jesus clearly. An elevator provides access to the two levels of the church, and both levels of the school.

The church building includes a large, beautiful gathering space. Worshipers will be able to visit before and after services, regardless of the weather. A small kitchen provides a place to prepare coffee and other refreshments. An office suite includes a new pastor's office, and a secretary's desk with full view of the main entrance, a feature that will improve security for St. Lucas Lutheran School. A distinctive feature of the design of the church is a large window from ground level to the roof facing the Milwaukee River. The lower level will be finished in the future and include a Bible study/dining room that will take advantage of a beautiful view.

While the church building is ready for the congregation to move in, a couple of features will be completed over the next several months. Stained glass windows from the old church will be removed, reshaped, and installed in the new church. This work is expected to take four to five months. The 1932 Verlinden pipe organ will also be removed and rebuilt. Nolte Organ Building from West Allis will complete this work in early summer 2026.

The architect for the building is Groth Design Group, from Cedarburg. The builder is Catalyst Construction. Financing was provided by Westbury Bank.

St. Lucas Lutheran Church is located at 1420 Parkview Dr. in Kewaskum.

Jury Convicts Man of Mayhem, Aggravated Battery, False Imprisonment, and Strangulation and Suffocation from a Multi-Day Domestic Violence Attack in The Town of Barton

Re: State of Wisconsin vs. Willie B. Johnson (Case No. 2022CF000637)

On October 31, District Attorney Barry J. Braatz announced that on October 30, a Washington County jury convicted Willie B. Johnson of Mayhem with a Dangerous Weapon, Aggravated Battery with a Dangerous Weapon, False Imprisonment with a Dangerous Weapon, Strangulation and Suffocation, Battery, and Criminal Damage to Property. All charges include a domestic violence enhancer and a repeat offender enhancer.

The convictions stem from December 18, 2022 through December 21, 2022. Over multiple days, the defendant tied the victim's hands and feet together using a power cord, used a hot knife to burn the victim multiple times on her legs, used a hot stove grate to burn the victim on her back, strangled the victim with a cord, stabbed and battered the victim causing other significant injuries, and held the victim in the residence against her will.

The defendant faces a maximum possible sentence of more than 70 years of initial prison confinement. The sentencing date is scheduled for January 23, 2026, at 1:30 p.m., before Judge Michael S. Kenitz.

District Attorney Braatz stated: "The victim showed tremendous courage in surviving this brutal attack and by testifying; telling the jury of the vicious assault she endured at the hands of the defendant. I commend her for her bravery and resilience, and I commend the Washington County Sheriff's Office for their diligent work in helping achieve justice for the victim. If you or someone you know is experiencing domestic violence, resources are available through the national Domestic Violence hotline at 800-799-7233 and locally through FRIENDS, Inc. at 262-334-7298."

This case was investigated by the Washington County Sheriff's Office, led by Detective Luke Wilhelm, with assistance from the City of Milwaukee Police Department and FBI. This case was prosecuted by Deputy District Attorney Jeanette K. Corbett.

15 Years Ago

November 4, 2010

Kewaskum High School removed Native American-themed mascot displays, including a mural of Chief Kewaskum and a wood carving moved to a janitor's closet, following recent state legislation. School board president John Kenworthy expressed disappointment that the images were removed without board or community discussion, noting the action was intended to be pre-emptive to help challenge a future decision on changing the "Indians" team name.

The Kewaskum Indians football team defeated Luxemburg-Casco 15-13 in a playoff game, thanks to a 33-yard field goal by sophomore Hunter Flanders in the fourth quarter. The defense held off the Spartans, forcing a crucial fumble recovery by Bo Seibel late in the game. Kewaskum, now 10-1, advances to face undefeated West De Pere in a Level 3 playoff rematch from the previous year.

Voters in the Town of Farmington overwhelmingly defeated a binding \$200,000 road referendum by a 2-to-1 margin. Conversely, the Town of Kewaskum's non-binding referendum to borrow \$200,000 for road repairs passed narrowly (51.5% to 48.5%), though the Town Board has indicated a simple majority might not be enough to proceed with the plan.

The Village of Kewaskum's proposed 2011 budget includes a slight levy decrease and a major drop in its mill rate due primarily to a reassessment. The Village Board approved two-year contracts with two village unions (AFSCME and Labor Association of Wisconsin), which include a 2010 wage freeze, a split 2% raise in 2011, and a switch to the state health insurance plan to save an estimated \$75,000 in 2010.

The committee, which includes business and union representatives, is a "true private-public" venture aimed at providing a skilled labor force for the region. This groundbreaking effort is in response to a critical shortage of skilled workers that is threatening area businesses.

Kewaskum Elementary School (KES) achieved a rare and "perfect attendance day" on the morning of Friday, Nov. 3, with no absences among the 367 students. To celebrate this momentous occasion, the Kewaskum Dairy Queen generously donated certificates to every student for a free ice cream sundae. The principal called the event "even more rare than Halley's Comet".

and is collected through local property taxes, but none of this money stays with the Kewaskum School District.

"Over 300 of Wisconsin's school districts see less state aid than last year. This is concerning in that the state has the ability to fund additional school support but chose not to keep up with even nominal inflationary increases to costs. It's true that, from a statewide perspective, enrollments are decreasing but that is already baked into the current school funding formulas," said Kewaskum Business Manager Keith Brightman.

The Kewaskum School District continues to prioritize fiscal responsibility while investing in initiatives that directly benefit students. The 2025-26 budget maintains or enhances:

- Academic and career-readiness programs that prepare students for college, trades, and the workforce
 - Maintain music, arts, and extracurricular opportunities
 - Investments in instructional technology, curriculum renewal, and student support services
 - Safe, well-maintained learning environments
- "We know that maintaining community trust starts with transparency," Bazata said. "Our fo-

cus remains on providing families and taxpayers with clear, accurate information and demonstrating how every dollar contributes to student learning and success."

The Board and administration encourage residents to visit the Kewaskum School District website for more details about the 2025-26 budget, including how changes in state funding impact local property taxes and how tax dollars are invested in student programs.

Fr. Conley and the Kermis

The St. Martin's Kermis is a tradition dating back to the 1880s, in Ashford Township. There are many eras of the event commemorating the Roman Catholic feast day of St. Martin's of Tours, which happens to be on Veterans Day. Sometimes it was a two-night party at the Ashford Hall commemorating exactly on the 11th. In other years, it was just a one-night affair that included a polka band. This year, as in recent years, the event results in an enjoyable take-home treat after Sunday Mass (November 9) including chili, chicken soup and awesome desserts. Regardless of the transition of what the Kermis was, Rick Jaeger concludes the most memorable Kermis was the year the goose left a tip on Fleischman's bar.

An Irish Influence on St. Martin's

Rick Jaeger grew up in Ashford, the son of Vic and Irene Jaeger. Rick served mass for Fr. Joseph Conley, and described the priest as jolly, inspirational and very spiritual. "He knew how to have a good time, but he also knew how to bring it into contact with life." Fr. Conley could also raise funds for the church, because he utilized his connections outside the parish and had an ability to get parishioners to support St. Martin's. As Rick observed, "He knew how to work people over and get it done for nothing. Including my dad! He got some landscaping work done from him. He got a new heating system out of Pat Jaeger. He knew how to convince people to give to the church." Maintaining a parish required a social awareness to make a church run, and Fr. Conley had those skills.

Fr. Conley was also articulate. "He had great homilies. And because he was Irish, and he just had a great personality." Furthermore, "He was in the Air Force before he came to Ashford. He was a chaplain in the Air Force, and the first parish they gave him was Ashford, of all places. I mean, he was used to dealing with the public and being with people and they stuck him in Ashford.... For us it was a good thing; but for him it was a poor choice. And he'd get lonely at night, and once in a while after he got to know my parents, while I was in the seminary - he'd call my dad at nine o'clock at night and say, "Hey Vic, I'm gonna come over for a while." Then they'd share a drink and just talk, because he was lonely up on that hill." One has to understand how some saw priests in the 1960s. Fr. Conley "got to know my parents, because my parents always thought priests were like God."


According to the *History of St. Martin Parish*, compiled by Gerry Jaeger, Fr. Joseph Conley served as pastor of St. Martin's from 1963-1966. "In keeping with his Irish heritage, and reminiscent of St. Patrick, he commissioned Agnes Hall to repaint the statue of St. Martin with green robes. He was also remembered for the landscaping that was done, especially the filling of the grounds to the west side of the main driveway."

Meanwhile, Rick remembered that the statue of St. Martin was not front and center of the church, and credited Fr. Conley not only for the decision to paint the statue green but also making it the focal point of the church. This position is supported in Jaeger's book, which includes a picture of Fr. Conley's predecessor, Fr. Krause at the latter's Golden Jubilee to the priesthood, in which the Sacred Heart of Jesus statue was centered in St. Martin's Church within the pillars that today frame St. Martin of Tours.

So how did Rick think Fr. Conley fit in at St. Martin's? "Well, at first, he went over really big. He was Irish, but he could speak German. He even heard confessions for people who spoke German in German. And that went over good." Then Rick talked like parishioners back then, "Oh my gosh, we got this Irish priest, and he can speak German." He played with that a little bit with some of them.... So they were happy like h*ll with him."

A Visit to the Seminary

Rick said Fr. Conley steered him in his own attempt to become a priest. "When I went to see him the first time (that) I decided to go to the seminary; he was very understanding about that." Rick was engaged before he went. Fr. Conley said, "That little girl that you bring to church, she's got to go." Rick laughed at the time and told Fr. Conley, "Yeah, I know that."

Schooling to be a priest was a struggle. "In those days, the first two years were just terrible. You couldn't do anything. You had to wear your cassock at all times, and the only time you could take it off was if you were playing sports. You had to go to bed at 10 o'clock at night and there was somebody to check up on you to make sure you were, and you had chapel at six o'clock in the morning." This was all at Mount St. Paul in Waukesha, which was run by the Salvatorians. "They had rules like you couldn't believe. And you couldn't have a car. And your parents could come down occasionally - not very often.... Those were the days... And the reason I had to go there for two years was because I didn't have any Latin background, and everything was Latin in those days."

With those sacrifices in mind, Fr. Conley was understanding and supportive. Rick went back to the priest's tenure at St. Martin's in Ashford. "I went to the seminary when he was here... I was 20, because on my 21st birthday, I was in the seminary, and I didn't have any money to be honest with you." Rick worked for the seminary washing dishes and scrubbing floors, and his 21st birthday was another day of work. "And all of a sudden, the president of the college walks in while I was washing dishes. He says, 'The spiritual director from the archdiocese is here.' I said, 'My spiritual director from the archdiocese?' I had no idea who the h*ll that was, and here it was Conley. He said, 'Your 21 today! I got permission, let's go out for supper.'" It was such a rare reprieve from the institution that an older seminarian couldn't believe Rick got a break and asked if he could join them. And as Rick said, "Conley" took the older

seminarian along too. Then when they went to the bar, "Conley gave me some money and he said, 'Go up, I want to see 'em card you!' And they didn't card me." That 21st birthday brings back smiles courtesy of the priest.

The Goose at the Kermis

One of Rick's favorite memories of Fr. Conley comes with the Kermis. First, one has to understand the significance of St. Martin of Tours and his accompanying goose honored with the statue in St. Martin's Church in Ashford. "I don't know if you know the story behind the goose?" Rick asked. "But the goose gave St. Martin away. They wanted to make him bishop, and he didn't want to be. So, he went and hid in a cave, and the d**n goose kept walking back and forth in front of it, because it was his goose I guess. So that's how the goose got there." Perhaps an indication of his humility, St. Martin did not want the bishop position, but an obnoxious goose thought otherwise. The short story is Martin did not want to be bishop, the goose followed him, so therefore he was made bishop.

Well, fast forward more than 1,500 years after St. Martin's death, and Fr. Conley wanted to make the story relevant to those at the hall in Ashford, where he brought a live goose to Fleischman's tavern the night of the Kermis. So, did Conley only do that once? "Well, I think that was only once... Because you know why? The goose pooped on the bar." Rick laughed, noting the accident explains why the live goose at the Kermis was a once-in-a-lifetime experience. "Fr. Conley laughed like h*ll. Tillie Jaeger was there." Then when the goose did its business, "she yelled out and told everybody, 'The goose just S**T on the bar!!'" And Conley just thought that was so funny that she would say that." Fr. Conley was the type who'd laugh at it. So, Rick concludes the goose's stay that night at Fleischman's only lasted "Till it crapped in the bar." Whose goose was it? "That I don't know; and the people who would know that are dead."

Rick admitted he was Fr. Conley's number one fan. "I was like a son to him. Let's put it that way. When he left Ashford, I had a talk at his farewell/going away. It was interesting, I hated to see him go." Rick even helped the priest move to his new parish in Bristol, near the Illinois border. Conley's era was less than four years at St. Martin's, but the influence remains 60 years later.

One of the reasons Rick shared his story was out of his strong belief that we have to preserve the culture and churches of the area. Fr. Conley's goose is an example of the old days at St. Martin's. It's the priest's Irish humor and a farmwife's direct and honest appraisal at Fleischman's, all recalled by a man looking back at the best of his childhood. It's a safe bet Fr. Conley would appreciate your support on Sunday Nov. 9, after mass.

Drexel Opens the Door to New Facility

Drexel Building Supply has opened a sprawling, state-of-the-art mill-work plant in Kewaskum, bringing more than 130 jobs to the community — with plans to expand to over 200 jobs as additional shifts come online. The team celebrated the new location with a grand opening on Nov. 2.

The new 350,000-square-foot facility, covering roughly eight acres, is designed to handle high-volume production while preserving quality. It has the capacity to finish 100,000 feet of moulding and assemble up to 500 doors daily. The plant specializes in ready-to-hang interior doors, exterior and hollow metal commercial doors, and finishing for doors, moulding, stair parts, and boards. The environmentally controlled environment ensures consistent product quality year-round.

Each day, staff send out more than 150 deliveries to residential and commercial clients across the region. The plant is expected to be a major driver of local employment as Drexel expands operations to include second and third shifts.

“Our unique culture to supply happiness will hopefully be a positive ripple effect in our community,” said Joel Fleischman, president and co-owner of Drexel Building Supply. “Kewaskum has some of the best people I’ve ever encountered. It’s all about the people, and Kewaskum has a lot of good roots and good families.”


Fleischman said the idea for the new facility was conceived about four years ago, following Drexel’s merger with McMahon and Company.

“We looked at other communities and properties but decided to build in this farm field in Kewaskum.”

Drexel employs 840 team members and operates six supply locations, along with a roof and floor truss plant in Wrightstown and a wall and floor assembly off-site plant in Amherst.




Doors head into a room to be worked on.







Kewaskum Boys Soccer Season Ends in Sectional Final

The Kewaskum Indians boys' soccer team faced Fox Valley Lutheran on Thursday, Oct. 30, in the WIAA Division 3 Sectional Semifinal. Kewaskum entered the game with an overall record of 15-5-3 and a conference record of 9-2-1. Fox Valley Lutheran entered the game with an overall record of 15-4-4 and a conference record of 7-1. The two teams both took first place in their conferences.

Twenty-One Days in a Bear Stand

Hello friends,

My bearbaiting season started on April 15 and ended on October 7. One hundred-and-seventy-six days after it started and 21 hunts later, I had no choice but to throw in the towel as it closed. This week's column is about some of what I noticed and experienced running baits, hunting and talking to other hunters.

Doug Cibulka, my bear hunting partner, and I had four trail cameras out, and it was by far our best year ever for daytime pictures of big bear. These photos were so common that we did not even talk about them by mid-July. What we did talk about is that out of what was probably thousands of photos, we did not have a single sow come in with cubs.

Generally, sows and cubs are pests as they can become "glued" to the bait, which leaves nothing for other bear. I am not a biologist, but my prediction is that where we hunt in northern Juneau County, the wolves are eating the cubs. This is not just my theory, but it is shared by many outdoors people. A pack of wolves living in the same forest as sows with cubs has every day of the week, including some situations in the winter den, for something to go wrong.

As I wrote, I hunted 21 late afternoons. On every trip that I had for this job, during the bear season, I hunted on the way home. I also went on a bow hunt for deer and a fishing trip. In other words, from September 3 to October 9, I was running and gunning.

Doug and I had one bait that had the largest bear hitting it from about May 1 to September 24 that I have ever had come to one of my baits with regularity. This bear often trav-

eled with his lover, which was a sow in the 325-pound range. During the first 21 days of bear season, the sow or boar or both would come in 20 to 60 minutes after dark. Until bear season opened, they were regular, daytime, bait hitters.


I became so into hunting him that I sat on that bait for 17 nights. The only night that one of them came in before dark, I was at my buddy Chuck Reib's Celebration of Life.

I have written that I feel bear baiters, especially those that are willing to do some walking, are literally biologists without a degree. The changing seasons of the insects, the forest and swamp coming back to life, the fawns being born, the fawns being eaten by bears and wolves. The turkeys being born, the bear coming into heat in June and early July, the abundance of porcupine, and the horrible reality of way too many

raccoons now that the fur trapper has lost his or her market. The lack of ruffed grouse, drought, and flooding are all a solid part of a bear baiter's experience.

There is so much more that we observe, even the mental and physical ability, as well as financial, to just stay "into" the game. By October 7, I was probably in the best shape that I will be the rest of my life, carrying 25 pounds of bait and making good time while bushwhacking forest and swamp, which will do that to you.

My buddy Doug got a bear, but I was on one of my trips that pays my bills, and so our hauling crew of Joey Dushek, Joey Snooty and Nathan Potter, "younger guys," helped get Doug's bear out of the woods. There is a rule, though, and that is you have to have beer for the helpers, and it is a guaranteed good time once the bear makes it to the truck.

It kind of looks like Doug is going into retirement from the world of bear hunting. Doug is an active guy and wants to see the world. My partners have been Selina and Joey, just Selina, Michelle, Michelle, Doug and I, and now just me.

I did not see a bear in 21 nights. I had good friends harvest bear but other than Doug's, all were much further north, where you are not at the southern end of "real" bear country. I would strongly advise bear hunters to go at least 40 miles north of Necedah to hunt bear, as there are too few and they are too smart in my zone.

As for me, I'm 64, I figure I will be in my prime for about another 20 years before I start to age, so I will be the old geezer carrying a bucket of granola in the woods and looking for Mr. Big for many years to come!

Hunters: Help Your Fellow Wisconsinites Experiencing Food Insecurity by Participating in Deer Donation Program

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) encourages hunters to donate Wisconsin-harvested deer through the DNR's Deer Donation Program. The program helps stock food pantries and supports residents in need throughout the state.

"Community pantries all over Wisconsin are seeing a rising demand for food, especially as Wisconsinites lose access to food assistance due to the federal government shutdown," said DNR Secretary Karen Hyun. "Our Deer Donation Program helps provide nutrition-packed options like venison and we are optimistic hunters will continue their role in combating hunger in Wisconsin through this program."

According to data from the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, more than 700,000 Wisconsin residents (about 12% of the state's population) received food assistance in 2024, and demand is expected to rise.

Since the program began in 2000, hunters have donated more than 100,000 deer, totaling over 4 million pounds of ground venison, to help Wisconsinites in need.

Wisconsin has a network of venison donation partners, including



county land and water conservation departments, food pantries, charitable organizations, USDA-Wildlife Services and participating meat processors, who all help implement and administer the program.

Deer harvested outside Wisconsin cannot be donated. The Wisconsin Department of Health Services requires deer harvested in certain counties to be tested for chronic wasting disease (CWD) before or at the time of donation. Hunters interested in donating a Wisconsin-harvested deer to the DNR's Deer Donation Program should follow these steps:

- Field dress the deer. Please handle the carcass as if it were des-

tinued for your own plate. A couple of bags of ice placed in the cavity will help preserve the carcass in warm weather.

- Register the deer through GameReg. Please note the registration confirmation number and keep it on hand when dropping off the deer. If your deer was harvested from a county that requires CWD testing, please ensure you complete the required CWD testing before or at the time of donation. An up-to-date list can be found on the Deer Donation Program webpage.

- Call ahead. Contact a participating processor before dropping off the deer to make sure they have space to accept it. More processors may be

added later in the season, so check back if you don't see one currently in your area.

- Bring the deer to the processor. If donating a deer being tested for CWD, inform the processor and provide the CWD barcode number. The processor will not distribute the deer until the results are known.

Note: If you don't have your Go Wild customer number, game registration numbers or CWD testing information, please log into your Go Wild account or contact DNR Customer Service staff to retrieve that information.

Hunters and non-hunters may also support the Deer Donation Program through a monetary donation in person at any Wisconsin hunting license sales location or online through their Go Wild account.

Visit Wisconsin's Deer Donation Program webpage (dnr.wisconsin.gov/topic/hunt/donation) to learn more about the program.

Hunters participating in the Deer Donation program are encouraged to reduce the chance of introducing lead fragments to donated venison by using lead-free ammunition or taking simple steps to reduce risks when utilizing lead bullets. Lead is toxic to humans, even in very low amounts.

The village board continued to discuss their 2026 budget. Chief Bishop has expressed the need for an additional police officer to be hired in the Village of Kewaskum. The cost of this would range from around \$150,000 to \$180,000 with salary and benefits. In order to help with some of this cost, Chief Bishop has applied for a grant, but has not yet heard back. An additional proposed option for this was to hire a new officer in July to help cut some of the costs for this year. The Chief is still waiting to hear back from the grant. The village discussed what the option could look like if the grant is not awarded to help with some of the costs. This included a referendum that would need to be submitted by January.

There were mixed opinions from board members if the referendum would pass and what they would need to do if it did not pass, but there was a general consensus during the discussion that an additional officer was needed. Since it was just discussion, there was no decision made at the meeting.

The board continued to review their long-range financial plan. They adopted the long-range financial plan with a unanimous vote of 7-0. The long-range financial plan cannot bind a future board to any spending, but it is meant to serve as a guide and help outline goals for the board. It can be continuously changed and edited to better fit the needs of the community and the board.

The board discussed possible action on borrowing for capital projects. Previously, the Parks and Recreation Committee had come to the board with TRIBE's request to redo the fourth baseball diamond at Kiwanis. This was previously where the high school team played. The field had become un-

usable after the high school moved to their own diamond. The project would cost around \$50,000. There are additional projects that could also be improved at Kiwanis, such as additional lighting, resurfacing the tennis courts and basketball courts, and working on expanding the library into the portion of the building that was previously used as the police station.

This borrowing would be thought of as more of a borrowing for multiple recreation projects, not just for the parks. The village board approved the borrowing for capital projects for \$200,000. This would result in an additional tax rate of .3570 or \$125 for a home valued at \$350,000. Jim Hovland made a motion to approve capital borrowing for \$200,000, and it was seconded by Justin Weninger. It passed with five votes yes, one vote no.

The village will hold its next meeting on November 17, at 7:00 p.m. The village will be holding their budget open house on November 12 at 7:00 a.m., 12:00 p.m., and 7:00 p.m.


