## Farmington Planning Commission Updates Zoning for Shalom Wildlife Zoo

The Town of Farmington Planning Commission held its regular meeting on Thursday at 7 p.m. at the Farmington Town Hall.

The big topic of this meeting was the zoning ordinance for Shalom Zoo. Many people chose to attend this meeting to show their support for Shalom, with the meeting almost having a full house of attendees. Many showed their support for Shalom by wearing apparel supporting the zoo.

There were two issues for the board to address pertaining to Shalom. The first was to update the zoning ordinance, and the second was to discuss the fencing between Shalom and the neighbors who have been suing the zoo.

While addressing the update to the zone ordinance, the town attorney, Michael Bauer, explained that this proposed ordinance would define zoological activity and further outline what could be done at the zoo. It further defines what the zoo can do on the property, which better aligns with the zoo's goals and plans for the property moving forward. The updated ordinance better defines what "zoological activities" are, allowing the zoo to participate in the care, exhibition, preservation, and breeding of animals with associated educational programming on parcels of land containing no less than 100 acres of land. This would allow Shalom to have things like a visitor center, trails, parking lots, and educational facilities. This update would also allow for things like weddings, educational operations, food, drink, and gift sales.

The board also discussed the fence that Shalom plans to put up on their side of the property line between 1797 and 1809 Shalom Drive. The two parties are currently in discussion about what the fence should look like. The planning commission discussed the fence and how the two parties are currently in negotiation. The planning commission decided that the best way to handle it was to table it until the two parties had agreed on a fence, then discuss once the final fence design is approved.

Both of these agenda items have been sent to the board with the planning commission's recommendations for the board for further discussion. A public hearing will be held on the Matter of an Ordinance Amending Text of the Town of Farmington Zoning Code, Town of Farmington, Washington County, Wisconsin-Referencing Resolution 2025-11.



Dear Reader,

There's a peculiar alchemy that happens when you reach a certain age and find yourself leafing through old yearbooks or stumbling across a box of letters tucked away in the attic. The person staring back at you from those faded photographs—the one who was absolutely certain that this love, this heartbreak, this moment would define the rest of their days—seems almost like a stranger.



porch—they taught us about vulnerability, intimacy, and the courage it takes to open your heart to another person. They were our training ground for love.

But time has a way of shrinking even our most monumental moments down to size. The universe that revolved around who ran with whom in high school expands dramatically when you step onto a college campus, then expands again when you enter the working world, start a family, or simply accumulate enough life experience to understand that there are many different ways to love and be loved.

The love that sustains us through the decades—in marriage, in friendship, in family—is built on different foundations than teenage passion. It's less about the intoxicating rush of new feelings and more about the daily choice to care for another person through ordinary Mondays and extraordinary challenges alike.

Perhaps that's the real gift of perspective: not that high school love was meaningless, but that it was preparation. Those intense feelings, that certainty, that willingness to believe in forever—they were practice for the more complex, less dramatic, but ultimately more enduring forms of love that would follow.

So when I see today's teenagers convinced that their current romance will last forever, I don't have the heart to tell them otherwise. They'll discover soon enough that their universe is far larger and more interesting than they can imagine. And perhaps, like the rest of us, they'll look back with fondness on those days when love felt like the most important thing in the world—because for a brief, shining moment, it was.

I've been thinking lately about the fierce intensity of high school love, prompted by watching my own grandchildren navigate those turbulent waters with the same breathless certainty we all once possessed. ## Forty Days and Forty Nights of Shame

Dear Reader,

As I write this, it appears that our legislators have reached an agreement to reopen the government. It is long past time. Just like the biblical forty days and forty nights, we endured 40 days of a government shutdown that exposed the ugliest truth about Washington: the people who created this crisis were paid handsomely while the people who kept our country running were not.

Since October 1st, over one million federal workers toiled without pay or sat home furloughed. Air traffic controllers guided planes safely through our skies without a paycheck. TSA agents screened travelers. These are just a few examples of federal employees who worked without compensation, hoping that someday—when these politicians finally did their jobs—they would re-

ceive back pay for their loyalty and sacrifice.

Meanwhile, every member of Congress continued to collect their salary. Thanks to a permanent appropriation in place since 1983, Senators and Representatives received their \$174,000 annual salary like clockwork. Senate leaders pull in \$193,400 a year; they still got their checks. The Speaker of the House got his \$223,500. The Constitution itself mandates they be paid, regardless of whether they're working or holding the country hostage.

Consider the disparity: Members of Congress make nearly twice the average pay of a federal employee—and they were paid while the government was closed while federal workers got nothing. While Congress collected paychecks for doing nothing, government workers, many of them living paycheck to paycheck—suffered. They wor-

ried about making mortgage payments, putting food on the table, keeping the lights on. And yet, they showed up, doing their duty, serving their country. This isn't just unfair. It's disgusting.

Not all politicians are to blame. Some members from both parties genuinely worked to find compromise and put country before party. But those who refused to negotiate, who wouldn't give an inch, who preferred to see federal workers go unpaid rather than find common ground—they do not fit with what our country stands for.

America was built on compromise, on working together despite our differences. Politicians who forgot that fundamental truth have no business representing us.

We must remember this moment when election day comes. We can vote these politicians out of office and send them packing home to do nothing there, just as they did in Washington for the last 40 days. The difference will be they'll be doing it for no pay—except for the rich benefits they voted for themselves to receive after they leave office.

For forty days and forty nights, we watched this shameful spectacle. Now we need to remember it when it counts.

# Cousins Subs Bands Together with Community to Help Local Food Banks

Cousins Subs locations in Kewaskum and West Bend (Paradise Dr.), owned by Keith Novotny, will be hosting a fundraiser to help local food banks meet increasing demand.

On Thursday, November 13, Cousins Subs will donate \$1 from every sub sold to food banks across Washington County. Donations will be divided primarily between West Bend, Kewaskum, Hartford, and Slinger. Novotny credited Roric Griffith, founder of the Washington County Foodies Facebook page, with coming up with the idea for the fundraiser.

Griffith said, "Food pantries in our county have seen a massive increase in usage by folks who are food insecure. My reasoning was simply that if someone needs help, I hope they seek it out. If

someone can help, I hope they make the choice to help."

Novotny was quick to jump on board, pledging \$1 from every sub sold that day. Now, local participants are joining in, helping extend the fundraiser's reach.

Other local businesses and individuals who have also agreed to match the \$1 donation from every sub are Rorric Griffith, Wendy Wendorf, Randy Krell, Gorman's Rapid Mart, Uncle Larry's Kitchen, Smokes on Main, Kate RainMaker Grace, and Beyond The Shine.

"On an average day, we sell between 300 and 500 subs between both locations" Novotny said. "Our goal is to hit 1,000 subs or more for this fundraiser."

In addition to the per-sub donations, cash buckets will be placed at both Cousins Subs locations for customers who wish to contribute directly.

## WHAT WAS LOST

## Osceola – What's in a Name?

Osceola was a strong leader of the Florida Seminoles who is honored with the naming of Osceola Township in Fond du Lac County. This article examines the root structure of the word.

### The Black Drink

Although the township is named after a hero, the name itself references a drink that makes one profusely vomit.

Alvin M. Josephy Jr. (1915-2005) is a credible source in Native American research and presented the following points in *The Patriot Chiefs* through various editions and decades starting in 1958. He gives a succinct explanation of Osceola's name, which was pronounced Asi-Yaholo and meant "Black Drink singer." It refers to the serving attendant in the ceremony who would sing a long cry which accompanied the excessive drinking of the Black Drink, a potent medicine or power to purify the spirit. "The black liquid, made by boiling the roasted leaves of the cassina shrub, and stirring the brew into a froth, acted as a strong purgative, and when taken in large quantities also affected the native's imaginations making them feel exhilarated and powerful. Village leaders often took the Black Drink before councils to prepare their minds for debate, while warriors used the concoction to cleanse and strengthen their bodies for battle" (p.188). Josephy Jr. argued the people associated with Osceola (Muskogean-speaking peoples of the South) "would take long draughts and then force themselves

to throw up the liquid, spouting it in streams six- to eight-feet through the air." Some of the drinkers were throwing up simultaneously. "Judging by his name Osceola must have been an important participant in such ceremonies" (p.189).

There are many reasons why this drink was important. One, it can cleanse the body. It's crucial when making spiritual decisions that the evil and selfish spirits are absent. An example today is that one might see the smudging of sage at a Na-

tive American meeting, celebration or powwow. The focus is to have a good mindset. When I have experienced this with the Brothertown Nation, they explicitly request glasses to be taken off to cleanse your sight. Smudging with sage and tobacco are also meant to cleanse your thoughts and bring good balance to the heart and mind. If we could talk to those who took the Black Drink in the early 1800s, it seems likely that they would conclude that their concoction was more potent than saging. However, that is an assumption which can only be addressed by those who lived in that era.

A second point on the Black Drink is that the "purgative" could impact one's merger with the spirit world. The medicine forces one to have a clear head, albeit at the cost of vomiting. Whether one wants to label this a spiritual connection, hallucination or imagination, the process is important to Osceola and his people (who are the most important to believe in the event, given it is their culture). Overall, the ceremony and the meaning of the drink itself naturally contrast with the historical perceptions of the same topic nearly 200 years later.

### Various Forms of Spirituality

There are many ways indigenous people can connect with spirits. This can be done in a sweat lodge, where the cleansing ritual uses the qualities of a sauna and purification practices. Others might use dreams and prayers. In vision quests, one might refrain from eating for days to get to a position to be open to spirit. Every tribal nation is different, and so too is every individual person. These options are just being brought up in the context of understanding a spiritual element to Osceola, rather than just a military or leadership background. Please recognize simplifying anyone's spiritual experience can be offensive, particularly from an outsider trying to describe it.

There is also a balance of trying to describe what a spiritual experience is without being Native American. Then there is the delicacy of trying to explain a spiritual experience of someone else. For example, I remember Miscobinayshii (1932-2024), an elder of the St. Croix band of Lake Superior Chippewa, sharing with me her lodge experiences. Misco was also there for her husband, particularly as his health was failing. She was gracious in explaining what it was like to connect with the Spirit World. When I asked what her husband experienced, she reminded me that it was his to share and not her place to ask. As an individual person, he could share. He chose not to. With Misco's own experiences, her conclusion was to teach her own experience, while retaining dignity with another's spiritual connections.

Another balance is trying to explain what a spiritual experience is like in a society that questions Native American spiritualism, or to people who can't even fathom it. How can one contemplate what a Native American spiritual experience can be like if the observer has already concluded such an experience is not possible or immoral?

As it pertains to Osceola, here are some questions. What did he pray for? What were his conversations with medicine men and the spiritual leaders of the Seminoles?

What did he see in his dreams? As he was dying in prison, what did he "see" for the future of his people? Given the prophecy that associates with the other realms, what did he foresee would happen to the Everglades? And given our faith usually intertwines morality, what did he believe in regard to Southern planters and slavecatchers who were trying to catch Seminoles with African descent? With the above questions in mind, Osceola's quest for freedom wasn't one of individual liberty, it might be better described as one of faith.

Perhaps most important, this faith is intertwined with land and ecosystems (the Everglades), which starts to be destroyed once the philosophy (or spirit) of the land and Native Americans is intentionally eliminated.

In all the questions mentioned under the above heading, the questions all relate as to why he would induce vomiting. One cannot understand those questions if they are hung up on the "puking" or labeling it a "hallucination," rather than seeking to understand the power of spirit in those moments of taking the Black Drink.

### Removing Spirit from History

Along the lines of the delicate balance above, is a perspective of history removed from another realm from beyond. Because the spirit world is taken out of historical analysis, what happens is a published history watered down and distant from ethics, faith and possibly logic. The Osceola name alludes to the spiritual element of Native American leaders absent from other types of leaders in U.S. history and government.

The questions above take the observers to a spiritual dimension which often makes them uncomfortable to publish. Because the spiritual world is judged as unmeasurable by historical, research and academic standards, conversations on spirituality are not discussed in textbooks, and many historical texts in general. This is illogical, for it means our history of Native Americans is actually absent of the roots which truly define it.

One cannot separate Native American spirit from their history and how their beliefs validated their treatment of the natural world. As it pertains to Osceola, what results are narratives of the white Billy Powell (Osceola's other name) who turned to his Native roots and became a brilliant strategist who was a soldier and leader. Osceola is the Creek (another cultural root of his lineage) who represented and merged with the Seminoles. These are all adjectives and labels that some may find useful but lose potency when compared to existential questions of faith, spiritualism and the morality of respecting the environment. What evolves is a history as shallow as its diluted truth.

### Real Leadership is Spiritual

Let's compare our Presidents. There is a difference between a secular leadership and spirit. They might have religious values, but they don't hold religious leadership among the public. For example, George Washington (1732-1799) believed in neutrality in U.S. foreign policy. Did Americans pray to him in the last 200

## Olympic Speed Skating Trials set for January

Tickets are now on sale for the 2026 U.S. Olympic Long Track Speed Skating Trials, set to take place Jan. 2-5 at the Pettit National Ice Center in Milwaukee, with world champion and hometown favorite Jordan Stolz primed to take center stage.

Stolz, 21, who hails from Kewaskum, has quickly become one of the sport's brightest stars. The reigning world champion is expected to draw large crowds as he returns to compete on home ice, less than an hour from where he grew up.

The trials will determine which American skaters earn spots on Team USA for the 2026 Winter Olympics in Milan-Cortina, Italy. # Elk Camp

*Hello friends,*

This week and next, I will be writing to you about my experiences along with my 24-year-old daughter, Selina Walters, as we camped and hunted elk and deer in the Rocky Mountains near Livingston, Montana.

**Wednesday, October 29**

**High 43, Low 28**

My truck and 12-foot trailer were literally as full as they could be as I was about to make the final 10 miles up the mountain of a 1,360-mile solo drive on a very narrow and rough road with my daughter, Selina, following. No problems on the climb up but it took some focus; a wrong move could cause a fall off the edge, literally. In early August, Selina and I scouted this area for the first time, and there were lots of elk and deer. The excitement was top-notch and just the fact that I was about to spend 10 days wilderness camping with Selina, who lives in Missoula, was honestly the biggest thrill for me.

Before we even built camp, or should I say started, we went for a 1.3-mile hike from camp and saw one mule deer, no elk. When we returned to camp, which is a US Forest Service campsite that is old, beautiful and underused, we put up one of my two portable Eskimo ice shacks. This would be our sleeper shack and would have to be a ways from

our main hangout/cook shack due to grizzly bear common sense.

With the grizzly bear, let me tell you, everything is about common sense. Our campground had two bear boxes, which you put your food in or store it in a vehicle or a secure cooler; these are not options, they are requirements that are 100% common sense. Lack of caution can result in dead humans, grizzlies or both, and no one wants either. Selina has been living in the mountains for 20 months and she takes no chances, always carries bear spray and doesn't even leave a food wrapper around.

On our walk, we were hiking so fast we both walked within five feet of a skunk. We backed up, and there were no issues.

We did not put up the cook shack and had a "we made it" to elk camp shing ding cooking on the end gate of my truck and laughing a lot while Selina enjoyed the company of her favorite dog, Red.

**Friday, October 31**

**High, 54/44, Low 38/28**

This story is one of two planets for us, one is always at least 10 degrees colder than the other, one has three inches of snow, and one just a dusting and mostly grass. This is due to a three-mile atv trek, down mountain and an elevation drop of al-

most 1,000 feet. The atv ride can be crazy, as once our hunts started, it was long rides before sunrise on an ice/snow-covered mountain trail where focusing on staying warm is the name of the game.

Today was day three of hiking, and our legs are toughening up but will tire out.

**Saturday, November 1**

**High 52, Low 28**

We started our hunt today, going low, first the ride and then about a one-mile trek. Knowing how to dress is huge, warm for the ride, shed clothes for the hike and dress up for the hunt. We left camp at 4:30 a.m., about three hours before daylight, separated and began watching the mountains for elk or deer, as we both had mule deer/whitetail tags, as well.

Long story short, we hunted till 30 minutes before dark, as on day one, we wanted to know how to get back to our machine. I had not seen a deer or an elk, neither of us heard a shot and Selina had seen a doe mule deer with her fawn.

If you know much about Selina and I, you might be aware that we are meat eaters and care little about rack size. On the hike back, we came across a whitetail buck on three separate occasions that was maybe a fork horn, and it offered easy shots. We let it pass, well aware we were only on day one of our hunt!

The mood is excellent, we're at elk camp!

years when war was imminent?

When the country was divided after the Civil War, did people still try to spiritually connect with Abraham Lincoln (1809-1865) to prevent disunion? Do people pray to Ronald Reagan (1911-2004) when they are scared of communists?

I am not asking these questions sarcastically. In the numerous conversations I have had about history, I don't hear historians and citizens talking about our presidents as leaders in spirit form after they have died. Raised in St. Kilian, I never heard someone talk about our government leaders as if they were spiritual leaders such as them being a Roman Catholic Saint and partaking in spiritual behavior.

Osceola is different. Here are two song examples. John Anderson took a big risk in the early

1990s when he wrote and released Seminole Wind, which features scenes in the music video symbolic of an indigenous celebration and spirituality at a campsite. Despite being a song well over four minutes, and one explicitly about the Seminoles of Florida (which had a population of a couple thousand in the 1990s), the song had national success. The lyrics clearly have a spiritual context: "I'm calling to you like a long-lost friend." That wind is not about a weather pattern. In addition, Anderson states, "And the last time I walked in the swamp, I sat upon a Cypress stump. I listened close and I heard the ghost of Osceola cry." The song is a merger of ethics with spirituality in the land of the Everglades.

An equally powerful quote comes from Osceola's great-great-grandson, Joe Dan Osceola, who with Ben Wilson wrote in the lyrics for the song "Osceola" — "Oh mighty warrior, great Sem-

inole Chieftain OSCEOLA your spirit is there, where the sawgrass waves. Watch over your children, oh the Seminole people. In the swampland called the Everglades."

This is the true power of Osceola — the concept that he was a leader in life, but so potent that his ideas and spirit lives on in death. In that context, Osceola is more than just a name of a historic figure. In the end, the importance of the Black Drink is crucial for understanding Osceola in a world where indigenous philosophy is often poorly understood. One cannot understand the situation of the Everglades without the validation of spirit. It leads one to question if they can understand the history of Osceola without understanding the spirituality of him either.

These are thoughts that stem from a purgative related to the Township's name.




