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## Regal Place Condos Hosts Grand Opening

The Regal Place Condos held its grand opening on November 17, at 3:00 p.m. The event was open to the public to watch the ribbon cutting ceremony and tour a staged unit. The Regal Place Condominiums are a part of Washington County's Next Generation Housing Initiative and are being developed by American Companies. The Condos will be built on the previous grounds of the Regal Ware Headquarters.

The goal of the Regal Place Condominiums is to add affordable housing in the village and make home ownership more widely available. Washington County Executive, Josh Schoemann, created the Next Generation Housing Initiative. He said, "I created the Next Generation Housing (NGH) program two years ago to address this critical issue. Since the collapse in housing markets in 2008, there has been little new building in the \$300K-420K range, pricing the working class out of the market. Literally, we are stealing the 'American Dream' from our young people. NGH tackles that problem by giving the opportunity of home ownership to our workforce, and Regal Place is a part of this effort." The starting price for the homes will begin at \$309,900.

Village of Kewaskum President Fuzz Martin opened up the ribbon cutting ceremony with a speech. When speaking with Fuzz Martin about what the opening of the Regal Place Condos means for the Village of Kewaskum, he said, "I don't think many people realize how difficult it can be to revitalize vacant industrial properties. Some sit empty for years, even decades, without contributing to their communities." He also thanked those who were involved in the Regal Place Condos Project. "We're extremely grateful to Regal Ware, American Companies, Washington County, Village staff,

## Campbellsport Saying Goodbye to a Community Staple

The doors at the Campbellsport True Value Hardware Store will be closing for the final time after 60-plus years of serving the local community on December 19.

According to a recent *Campbellsport News* "Glance Backward" article, Mr. and Mrs. Erwin Antonie opened a Ben Franklin Store on Main Street (currently the Hive Salon & Spa).

Jerry and Flora Schanen bought the store from Gil and Rose Howard in 1965 (Jerry had experience in the business as the manager of the Port Washington Ben Franklin), and the Schanens moved the Ben Franklin store to its current location in 1976, which was, at the time, an 8,000-square-foot building.

"There [were] fun promotional events in the 1960s and 1970s," said former Campbellsport Owner Chris Schanen. "The Chamber had a special promotion called 'Customer Appreciation' on Friday night, and a local person's name would be drawn and put into envelopes that were distributed to all the businesses open on Friday night with a set time (I think about 8 p.m.) The businesses would open the envelope, and if the person was in the establishment, they would win the cash prize," said Schanen. "The prize would go up each week until we had a winner."

The store has changed its merchandise mix many times over the years, since it started as a small variety store.

"Affectionately referred to as the 'Dime Store,' one of the original features was fresh bulk candy," said Schanen.

"As the store grew and the retail climate changed, the store changed to not only keep up but also survive and thrive," said Schanen. "Ladies and children's apparel, basic shoes, fabric/sewing, crafts, fresh floral, and expanded gifts are some of the unique departments on the variety side."

Chris and Barb Schanen, along with his sister, Sue Perry, and her husband, Brian, owned the Campbellsport Ben Franklin since the mid-1980s, with the Schanens managing the Campbellsport store and the Perrys managing the Mayville store.

In 2003, they bought several properties surrounding the store location and expanded the store to just under 18,000 square feet, and added the True Value Hardware brand to the store with lawn and garden, paint, and all other basic hardware departments.

In 2020, David Westphal and Nick Perry bought the Campbellsport True Value store from the

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


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
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## | CAMPBELLSPORT GLANCE BACKWARDS |

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## KEWASKUM'S DAYS GONE BY I

### 15 Years Ago

November 18, 2010

Kewaskum School Superintendent Michael Krumm defended his decision to paint over a high school field house mural of an Indian, a class gift from 1975. He stated the non-authentic image was covered to avoid a formal complaint under a new state law that targets race-based mascots. Residents expressed outrage that the action was taken without community knowledge, calling it "vandalism". Krumm plans to form a committee to replace it with an authentic image.

The Boltonville Fire Department recently placed a new 2010 GMC Yukon XL sport utility vehicle into service. The vehicle replaces a mini-pumper/first responder truck and offers more space for personnel, equipment, and state-of-the-art lights and communication gear. The entire purchase was funded by the department's two annual fundraisers, the popular Rain Days Picnic and Street Dance.

The Kewaskum Statesman celebrated its 115th anniversary, having first been printed on October 5, 1895, just five months after the Village of Kewaskum incorporated. The paper's history included changing office locations, various owners like Charles E. Krahn, George H. Schmidt, and the Harbeck family, and a temporary halt in publication in 1972 due to illness. Current publishers Andrew and Nicole Kuehl purchased the business in 2008.

Kewaskum Elementary School and Kewaskum High School both held programs honoring veterans. At the elementary school, the Kettle Moraine Detachment Marine Corps League presented the history and proper folding of the American flag. The high school ceremony featured Sgt. Jeremiah Schroeder of the US Marines, a 2001 Goodrich graduate who served two tours in Iraq as an aircraft firefighter. Schroeder emphasized that Veterans Day is about honoring those "still with us".

Kayla Oelhafen, a 14-year-old Kewaskum High School freshman from the Town of Wayne, is highlighted for her academic success and involvement in numerous activities. She is an accomplished equestrian, competing with her American Paint horse, Jen, in events like barrel racing and English showing, earning multiple awards. Kayla is also a member of the Wayne Crusaders 4-H Club, shows beef steers, and plays the alto saxophone in the high school marching, jazz, and concert bands.

November 23, 2000

The Town of Kewaskum board met to discuss the 2001 budget, maintaining the tax levy at \$208,000, the same as in 2000. The levy has been between \$203,000 and \$208,000 since 1997. The primary focus for the 2001 budget is debt service, which includes \$50,000 budgeted for the Highway 45/Badger Road realignment debt.

Town board members and employees also received their first wage/hourly raises since 1995 and 1998, respectively.

The Kewaskum School Board met and approved the October expenditures of \$1,279,715.42. A discussion centered on a graduation survey to determine if the high school should change the date of graduation to a Saturday or Sunday, as it conflicts with the state track tournament. Two new courses, Current Affairs (elective) and Computer Machining, were approved for addition. Open houses for the Wayne and Farmington elementary school building projects are scheduled for Sunday, Dec. 3.

Kewaskum Middle School student volunteers are contributing time to reshape the exterior of the Middle School. The project is transforming an area with only grass into a winding path and a native plant garden. Plantings include red dogwood, wild roses, witch hazel, asters, purple cone flowers, and black-eyed susans. Students involved in the pathway construction include Savanna Zettler, Nicole Langenfeld, Jacob Sabel, and Clayton Stoffel.

The board accepted Rohlinger Construction's bid of 29¢ per cubic yard to remove and stockpile topsoil this week. This new station will replace the existing quarters in the 25-year-old municipal building.

Dr. Dennis Connors, a Marquette University graduate and former Navy service member, has joined Dr. F. E. Nolting's dental practice in Kewaskum, effective November 15. Concurrently, Dr. Robert E. Filete, Jr., formerly associated with Dr. Nolting, has opened his new dental office in the Professional Building at 1053 Fond du Lac Ave.

For the first time in history an attempt was made to assassinate a president of the United States at his official residence. The plot came to an end in a blazing gun battle at the very steps of Blair House, the temporary White House. The assassins were identified as Griselio Torresola, who died almost instantly of wounds, and Oscar Collazzo, seriously wounded, both of New York.

Chief Harry J. Schaefer and Assistant Chief Arnold Martin of the Kewaskum Fire Department were to Grand Rapids, MI, last weekend to pick up and drive home the firemen's new truck which has been purchased.

The deer season in Wisconsin opens at 8 a.m. Saturday and runs through November 24. According to demands for deer tags, a record turnout of 310,000 hunters was expected to invade the northwoods this year. The regulations for this season allow one deer any age or sex. # Buffalo Trinity Cemetery Gets New Sign

Buffalo Trinity Cemetery, located at 3297 East Moraine Drive in the Town of Kewaskum, has a new sign. The cemetery dates back to May 1, 1858, when the Evangelical Lutheran Trinity Church was organized as part of the Lutheran Buffalo Synod. A deed from 1858 documents that August and Carolina Klug sold the plot of land where the cemetery is located to trustees of the Evangelical Lutheran Trinity Church and Society.

Church trustees in 1858 included Daniel Backhaus, John Mueller, and August Klug. In 1867, Carl Backhaus and Ludwig Habeck were trustees. The first burial in the cemetery, also known as Buffalo Synod Cemetery, was Heinrich Klug (Nov. 7, 1803-Sept. 17, 1860).

Between 1858 and 1882, there were several deeds signed and recorded, with the Buffalo Trinity Cemetery property going between the church and various landowners. In 1876, a deed shows that church trustees included: Caroline Klug, widow of August Klug, of the Town of Kewaskum; John Luecke and his wife Johanna of the Town of Scott; Henry Ramel and his wife Bertha of the Town of Auburn; Hermann Klug and his wife Fredericke of the Town of Kewaskum; and August Habeck and his wife Auguste of the Town of Kewaskum.

Although the official name of the church was Evangelical Lutheran Trinity Church, it also has been referred to as Trinity Lutheran Church and Buffalo Trinity Church (because it was part of the Buffalo synod). However, among locals, the church was most commonly referred to as Moldenhauer Church.

Perhaps it was called Moldenhauer Church because on March 25, 1876, much of the land around the church was sold to Martin Moldenhauer. In 1905, land was sold from Martin Moldenhauer to Paul Moldenhauer.

However, it most likely earned the name because the church's longtime pastor was Martin Moldenhauer's brother, the Rev. Samuel Moldenhauer, who was named pastor of the church circa 1873. Prior to the Rev. Samuel

Moldenhauer being named pastor, the church was served by visiting ministers.

The Rev. Samuel John Augustus Moldenhauer was born in the small, unincorporated German hamlet of Kirchhayn, located in the Town of Jackson, WI, in 1848. The Rev. Samuel Moldenhauer married Hanna Justine Elizabeth Habeck on Feb. 17, 1874. The couple had a son, Paul, who died in infancy, and one daughter, Anna (nicknamed Annie) Moldenhauer, who was born in 1879. Annie served as the church organist for many years. In 1903, Annie moved to Milwaukee, and she married Frank Theumler in 1905.

It is presumed that the Rev. Samuel Moldenhauer and his family lived in the parsonage in Kewaskum for many years. In 1903, it was reported in the Kewaskum Statesman that he lived in Rosendale. In July 1906, the Kewaskum Statesman reported that the Rev. Samuel Moldenhauer resigned from his position as pastor of the Moldenhauer Church due to ill health. He and his wife then moved to Milwaukee in October 1906. On June 15, 1907, the Kewaskum Statesman reported that Rev. Moldenhauer became a marriage parson in Milwaukee. However, he continued to be reported as the pastor of the church in Kewaskum in the Lutheran Almanac and Yearbook through 1909. The Rev. Samuel Moldenhauer died July 17, 1918, at age 70 and was buried in Glen Oaks Cemetery,

also known as Evergreen Cemetery, in Milwaukee.


On Aug. 18, 1906, the Kewaskum Statesman reported that the Rev. Grauber of Buffalo came to Kewaskum, and services were to be held at Good Templar's Hall instead of inside the church.

In 1907, a year after he was ordained, the Rev. Louis Henry Ziemer was named pastor of the Moldenhauer Church. At age 17, Ziemer had attended the Martin Luther Theological College and Seminary in Buffalo, NY. He was ordained in December 1906 in Holy Trinity Church in Buffalo. It is unclear how long he remained in Kewaskum. The Moldenhauer Church was still active in May 1908, when a funeral was held there.

On Oct. 23, 1909, it was reported in the Kewaskum Statesman that "trustees of the Evangelical Lutheran Trinity or better known as the Moldenhauer Congregation, sold the church parsonage last Wednesday."

After the church disbanded, the membership disbursed, some to St. John Lutheran in New Fane and some to St. Lucas Lutheran Church in Kewaskum. The church records reportedly went to St. Lucas, but they have since been lost. Today, all that remains is the cemetery.

At one time, the Moldenhauer Church building was located on the northeast corner of the Buffalo Trinity Cemetery property. A concrete block can still be seen in the ground where the front step was. According to accounts that former town resident Dale Stern has heard, a carriage house for horses was located directly behind the church, and a school building was built on the northwest corner of the property. Stones still outline where the carriage house and school were on the prop-

erty. The parsonage was located on the north side of East Moraine Drive, across from the church.

It is unclear what year the church building was constructed on the property. The school and parsonage appear on the 1873 plat map, while the 1892 plat map shows the German Lutheran Church and Cemetery on the property. On April 11, 1903, the Kewaskum Statesman reported that church improvements were made to the Moldenhauer Church. The church is still depicted on the 1929 plat map.

The church was razed sometime between 1929 and 1937, as the church is not pictured in a 1937 aerial map of the area. Agnes "Aggie" Meilahn Schaefer (1912-2000), who grew up in the neighborhood, told Stern that she remembered playing in the church building when she was a child. She said the entire church was torn down and buried beneath the ground where it once stood. Likewise, the old parsonage was buried, and workers uncovered old walls of the parsonage when they built the house that now stands at 9520 North Mill Road.

On Nov. 16, 1977, the Town of Kewaskum ac-

quired the cemetery. Since then, the town has had some of the headstones cleaned and repaired.


On March 15, 2010, the Kewaskum Town Board issued a proclamation for Kyle E. Jurss, a member of Boy Scout Troop 744, in recognition of orchestrating the cleanup of Buffalo Trinity Cemetery and installation of a new cemetery sign as part of his Eagle Scout project.

In 2025, the Kewaskum Town Board recognized that the sign had fallen into disrepair and approved the installation of a new cemetery sign. On Oct. 6, 2025, the new Buffalo Trinity Cemetery sign was installed.

To help document the history of Buffalo Trinity Cemetery, photos are being sought of the following:

- The Rev. Samuel Moldenhauer and his family
- The Moldenhauer Church, school and parsonage
- Family photos of Otto and Augusta Habeck, who were married in the Moldenhauer Church on May 4, 1886.

## Ten Days on a Montana Mountain

*Hello friends,*

To say that chasing elk, camping in the mountains and pushing myself to extremes is a passion is an understatement. I am so into elk and mule deer hunting that I have driven to Montana two years in a row to camp in grizzly country with my 24-year-old daughter, Selina Walters, during the month of August to scout. This year, we found good numbers of elk near Livingston and were very excited for our late October rifle hunt.


**Monday, October 27**

**High 46, Low 23**

I wrote last week that this 10-day way of life in the mountains is the tale of two elevations, one with snow and much cooler temps and one of just the opposite. This morning, Selina and I hunted near camp on what is over a mile hike for Selina and about 3/4s of a mile for me.

To be honest, today, which is day three of hunting and day six of camping, we have not seen much elk sign but did pass up some small whitetail bucks.

Both of us would be watching meadows that are carved out of a mountain valley with a beautiful stream running through it. We were both set up 30 minutes before daylight and, as always, very excited for our hunt. My big thrill on this hunt would be watching a red fox hunt mice for 30 minutes, and not so thrilling was a two-inch snowfall while hunting that had a way of getting everything wet.

One of the craziest/funniest stories of this trip was that despite next to zero action on spotting elk or talking to another hunter that saw an elk or even hearing a rifle shot was the teaser elk. Four times while we were sleeping at night, we had elk walk within 20 yards of camp, and four times while hunting, we walked into camp with elk tracks in the snow within spitting distance of our tents.

My guess is that the average person is thinking why didn't you hunt at camp. This may be tough to understand, but our camp was in a mountain drainage, and the elk that came through were traveling in dense spruce, and when we tracked them, there were no beds, no droppings, and I believe this drainage was a travel route.

We slept on the ground every night. One night, what must have been a very heavy animal walked within five yards of our tent. At first, I could hear it from a distance as its hoofs broke through the frozen snow,


then I could feel the pressure on the ground as its weight/body passed within 15 feet of us.

Another very interesting story that was nonstop is that everywhere we hiked, including our camp, there were a lot of coyote and fox. I had my three-year-old golden retriever, Red, along, and she was in heat and putting off a lot of scent. One night, we had a coyote that did not appear to be the least bit scared of us, and I was kind of thinking, the 'yote, as well as the fox, thought Red was smelling really good. On that same note, if you are looking for a pup from good stock, next summer, reach out to me, I will be keeping what will be my ninth golden since I was 20, and looking forward to it.

Here is another question: we would see deer, and it was split up between whitetail and mule deer. We all know how crazy a whitetail buck can get when the rut is on, how in God's name does a whitetail buck not breed a mule deer doe or vice versa with a mule deer buck?

For any older hunter, I think it is common knowledge that the evenings in camp after absolutely physical days are a pretty damn close tie to the enjoyment of the hunt. For me, the thrill of having Selina take over the cooking duties without being asked and her playlist of music on a speaker and our ability to enjoy every moment are what it is all about.

The trip down the mountain. Fill a 12-foot trailer and your truck bed with an atv and a thousand pounds

of other gear and go 10 miles down a snow- and ice-covered mountain at trip's end. Any type of negative luck is a real bad story. When we reached the bottom 80 minutes later, my brakes on all four wheels were so hot you could fry an egg on them.

Selina headed home to Missoula, I headed to Wisconsin, and I have a question that hopefully someone can answer.

I would like to find elk in late October and have not been having good luck the last couple of years. If someone has a suggestion, I would really appreciate it. Preferably Montana, not in what is guaranteed to be snow-covered mountain passes, perhaps at a lower elevation.

Hunt/fish with your children, have a friend for life!

## Campbellsport Food Pantry Rallies to Support Those in Need

For more than 50 years, the Campbellsport Food Pantry has quietly supported families in need throughout the Campbellsport area. As economic uncertainty and past government shutdowns ripple across the country, the pantry has seen demand surge — and the community step up in response.

"Last month, we served 55 cars in less than 90 minutes," said Lenore, a member of the food pantry's volunteer committee. "That's a significant increase from the 35 to 40 families we typically served before."

Volunteers attribute the rise not only to previous government shutdowns but also to the ongoing challenges faced by families during winter.

The pantry, run entirely by volunteers, has a core committee of six and typically mobilizes seven to eight volunteers for its occasional food distribution events. Staff said most of the food distribution is done on an individual basis, with those in need contacting the group directly, setting up a designated time for pick-ups.

"It's a huge positive that our village has this local food pantry to help people in our area," said Campbellsport Police Chief Andrea Dowland. "The cooperation of the community at large is fantastic — there's a lot of generosity and camaraderie."

Normally, the pantry does not hold drive-through pickup days, but it had held emergency pickups at the Campbellsport Piggly Wiggly, most recently on Nov. 12. Staff noted future drive-through dates could be a possibility. Recipients were asked to enter via the store's north

entrance and show a driver's license to confirm residence in the Campbellsport School District.

The Piggly Wiggly location is central to the pantry's operations.

"Our Piggly Wiggly is a huge foundation to our pantry being a success," Dowland said.

Store employees help bag items and provide space for the drive-through line, making it easier for families to receive assistance discreetly and efficiently.

While the pantry does not track donations by weight, volunteers report a sharp increase in both food and cash donations in recent months.

"There's been a drastic increase in people just willing to help in any way they can, whether it's food or cash," Lenore said.

While the pantry cannot accept home-canned or perishable foods, it welcomes non-expired, non-glass, shelf-stable items, as well as cleaning and hygiene products, paper goods, and feminine products.

Donations can be dropped off at St. Matthew's Parish Center or the Campbellsport Piggly Wiggly. The Campbellsport Police Department is also

accepting donations in its lobby.

The pantry's close relationship with local law enforcement helps connect families with additional resources when necessary. Volunteers recommend that those seeking assistance contact the Salvation Army or St. Vincent de Paul for referrals, as those organizations can provide broader support, such as fuel assistance or health services.

For those considering volunteering or donating, pantry committee members offer heartfelt encouragement.

"If you're on the fence about helping, do it once. It will make you feel good, and you'll want to do it again, because you're helping somebody else," Dowland said. "Even if you buy one thing or volunteer one time, that makes a difference."

In Campbellsport, the food pantry remains a testament to the power of community, proving that — as one pantry leader put it — "it takes a village to run a village."

sport Administrator Charlie Kudy. “They have been a staple of our Main Street, and will be missed!”



The Ben Franklin store at its original location on West Main Street.







## Kewaskum School Board November Meeting

The Kewaskum School Board held a regular meeting on Thursday, November 13, in the Kewaskum High School Library.

The board unanimously approved the high school boys’ hockey co-op with West Bend for 2026-2027 and 2027-2028. Currently, there is only one athlete participating, but there are more students that will be a part of the program next year.


The finance committee and building and grounds committee forwarded the FES flooring installation proposal to the board for approval. It is to replace the 25-year-old flooring throughout the building. The finance committee made the motion to accept the quote from Quest Interiors for \$69,938. This was unanimously approved by the board.

The new well in Farmington was dug based on DNR requirements, and had high levels of barium and iron. The DNR allows the district to blend water sources to meet requirements, so by blending the two sources together the district can get healthy levels. This also allows for redundancy, whereas if they plugged up the previous well they would lose this option. The District Administrator recommended this option because it gives the district more

flexible options for the future. They can always choose to just use the new well in the future if needed. The board unanimously agreed to blend the previous well with the new well. Sam’s Well drilling will be doing this project for \$21,365.

The finance committee forwarded the purchase of a 2025 Ford Expedition for the district to the board for approval. They will be purchasing the vehicle from Hiller Ford. The van that will be replaced is about 10 years old and will be auctioned. The finance committee stated that the vehicle that is going to auction should have held its value for resale. The van will be auctioned off in the summer.

The next meeting is set for December 11.

and the EDWC for finding a creative solution. Instead of an empty building, we now have homes where families will put down roots and continue the legacy that Regal Ware established in Kewaskum for generations to come.”

Martin believes that these new condos will bring new families to Kewaskum. “From the start, Regal Place, Washington County, and the Village were committed to making sure these homes provided an affordable option for young families and anyone looking for a tight-knit community with a high quality of life. Regal Place offers modern living just steps away from the middle and high schools, a short walk to our won-

derful downtown businesses, and minutes from the recreation of the Kettle Moraine. That’s a pretty great combination.”
