# Sunburst Ski Hill has Power Outage on Opening Day

Sunburst Ski Hill kicked off the start of their season on Saturday, November 29. The excitement was cut short when they experienced a power outage that resulted in visitors getting stuck on the chair lift located at the southern portion of the ski area. There were 14 individuals on the chair lift at the time of the outage. It was determined that the power outage was caused by downed trees.

The Kewaskum Fire Department arrived to

assist the Sunburst team at 5:46 p.m. Together they were able to evacuate everyone in around 40 minutes. According to a press release from the fire department, written by Assistant Chief James Warnkey, “Kewaskum Fire Department and Sunburst Ski Area train annually for this type of event to ensure a safe and timely evacuation to the patrons of the Sunburst Ski Area.”

Sunburst thanked guests who experienced this, saying, “We’d like to thank all of our guests for remaining calm, patient, and safe throughout the process.”

# Whitman’s OSCEOLA

The poem republished on the Seminole is so old it is part of the public domain. The literary piece promotes questions on who this Native American leader is. “Is” is important, given some argue his spirit still resonates today. The reasons for the poem’s value to the area are many and should be elevated in public discussion given a township in Fond du Lac County honors Osceola.

First, the poem is a story about Walt Whitman (1819-1892) who wrote it. The work was included in his *Leaves of Grass*, which was a collection of poems written in 1855, but over the years had multiple revisions and editions that wasn’t final until his death. The piece originally appeared in *Munyon’s Illustrated World* earlier in 1890, but was important enough for Whitman to put in his famous assembly of poetry. In doing so, the poem is a late-in-life reflection of a poet’s mind with a chance encounter of a witness to history.

# Kewaskum Middle School and High School Evacuate Due to Firearm Threat

On Tuesday, November 25, Kewaskum High School and Middle School received a phone call indicating a potential threat to harm students with a firearm.

School District leadership worked closely with the Kewaskum Police Department to dismiss students early and notify parents.

The suspect is being investigated in multiple counties and was arrested on Tuesday. He is currently in custody in a different county. He is facing multiple charges in multiple jurisdictions. This same individual was linked to bomb threats in Fond du Lac County, Rhinelander, and Tomahawk that were made between November 21 and November 24.

The suspect was located at a Tomahawk address and arrested by the Fond du Lac Police Department. There are currently ongoing investigations involving several threats made across several Wisconsin jurisdictions.

In a joint statement from Kewaskum School District and Kewaskum Police Department released on November 25, they said, “We are grateful for the professionalism, rapid response, and strong interagency collaboration demonstrated by everyone involved. Their decisive actions played a pivotal role in ensuring the safety of our schools during today’s incident.”

They thanked those involved saying, “We want to thank students, staff, and families of the Kewaskum School District for their patience and cooperation throughout the day. Safety remains our top priority, and we will continue to work together to maintain a secure learning environment for all.”

At this time, there is no ongoing danger to students or the community. This remains an active investigation.

# SBA Extends Deadline on Physical Damage Loans for Wisconsin Businesses, Private Nonprofits and Residents Affected by August Severe Storms

**Low interest disaster loans still available!**

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) announced the availability of low-interest physical disaster loans has been extended. The new deadline for filing applications for physical damage loans is Nov 12, 2025.

The filing deadline to return applications for physical property damage is Nov. 12, 2025. The deadline to return economic injury applications is June 11, 2026. However, after the deadline has passed, there is a 60-day grace period in which SBA will accept applications.

The declaration covers primary Wisconsin counties of Milwaukee, Washington and Waukesha; which are eligible for both Physical damage loans and Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) from the SBA. Small businesses and most private nonprofit (PNP) organizations in the following adjacent counties are eligible to apply only for SBA EIDLs: Dodge, Fond Du Lac, Jefferson, Ozaukee, Racine, Sheboygan and Walworth.

Businesses and nonprofits are eligible to apply for business physical disaster loans and may borrow up to \$2 million to repair or replace disaster-damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory, and other business assets. Homeowners and renters are eligible to apply for home and personal property loans and may borrow up to \$100,000 to replace or repair personal property, such as clothing, furniture, cars, and appliances.

Homeowners and renters are eligible to apply for home and personal property loans and may borrow up to \$100,000 to replace or repair personal property, such as clothing, furniture, cars, and appliances. Homeowners may apply for up to \$500,000 to replace or repair their primary residence.

Applicants may also be eligible for a loan increase of up to 20% of their physical damage, as verified by the SBA, for mitigation purposes. Eligible mitigation improvements include strengthening structures to protect against high wind damage, upgrading to wind rated garage doors, and installing a safe room or storm shelter to help protect property and occupants from future damage.

“One distinct advantage of SBA’s disaster loan program is the opportunity to fund upgrades re-

ducing the risk of future storm damage,” said Chris Stallings, associate administrator of the Office of Disaster Recovery and Resilience at the SBA. “I encourage businesses and homeowners to work with contractors and mitigation professionals to improve their storm readiness while taking advantage of SBA’s physical damage loans.”

EIDLs are for working capital needs caused by the disaster and are available even if the business or PNP did not suffer any physical damage. They may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable, and other bills not paid due to the disaster

Interest rates are as low as 4% for businesses, 3.625% for PNPs, and 3% for homeowners and renters, with terms up to 30 years. Interest does not begin to accrue, and payments are not due, until 12 months from the date of the first loan disbursement. The SBA sets loan amounts and terms, based on each applicant’s financial condition.

Disaster survivors should not wait to settle with their insurance company before applying for a disaster loan. If a survivor does not know how much of their loss will be covered by insurance or other sources, SBA can make a low-interest disaster loan for the total loss up to its loan limits, provided the borrower agrees to use insurance proceeds to reduce or repay the loan.

With the changes to FEMA’s Sequence of Delivery, survivors are now encouraged to simultaneously apply for FEMA grants and the SBA low-interest disaster loan assistance to fully recover. FEMA grants are intended to cover necessary expenses and serious needs not paid for by insurance or other sources. The SBA disaster loan program is designed for your long-term recovery, to make you whole and get you back to your pre-disaster condition.

Okay, so it wasn’t in a slum. Just a passel of poor folks. All living in the same building, a few rooms apiece. A boarding house is probably a better description. Still, the circle of wide poverty meant they were on equal terms.

Misery may love company now but it spelled sharing, little as a body owned back then. Generosity bloomed naturally as a rose. Thrived between neighbors thrown into the same lot in their daily struggles. A cup of sugar and a whole lot more.

Reduce wasn’t a problem as everyone did with a lot less. Recycle was the norm whether milk or other bottles, tin and cardboard during those lean times. My grandfather laughed when he saw Gold Medal Flour printed on a woman’s drawers hung to dry on a clothesline. Wasn’t only an advertisement on brick walls. She plumb forgot to bleach the name off first.

Of course, coming through such withering, weathering circumstances made Mom real circumspect to just throw away threadbare items. Up and saved pretty near any and everything. Worn out clothes and socks beyond darning wound up in the “rag bag.” In turn used as both batting material and outside squares for quilts. Or patches for holes in britches. Elastic from waistbands, buttons, cotton from pill containers found storage somewhere in our cupboards or the drawers of her Singer treadle sewing machine.

Dad similarly found fresh applications for bur-lap, or something as simple as a cart wheel for a grinder. Doing a MacGyver long before the TV series hero ever thought about solutions for unexpected contingencies. That’s how we scrimped by.

It might trigger our own memories of those meetings we had with people tied to a historical event, and the need to preserve our own viewpoint.

Second, the poem opens us up to the Marine’s view in the late 1830s. What was it like to be an agent for the U.S. military who saw Osceola in his final days at Fort Moultrie, South Carolina? By the time Whitman wrote the piece, 50 years passed. What would it have been like to serve our country, and be part of the bureaucratic mechanism that observed a Native American who was tricked under the flag of truce?

Third is the focus on Osceola. Despite being the title of the poem, there is a debate on who it’s about. Whitman wrote it, the Marine told it, and Osceola lived it. Along those lines with Osceola is the fourth person (the reader), on what he or she actually concludes. For example, what do you think about death, honor and purpose? The overarching theme is one of dignity in death. Even as he faded, Osceola took the time to be presentable to the Spirit World. These stoke questions on the importance of how we look when we die. Some say it doesn’t matter, but it did for Osceola, whose desire to cross over in the appropriate regalia was acquiesced. For those who believe they have seen spirits or ghosts, the question should be: “Have you ever seen them naked?” If not, where did the clothes come from? Clearly Osceola valued looking well before death. What were his reasons?

The goal of writing is to foster timeless thoughts and questions which remain. Symbolically, there

is a painting that goes along with Whitman’s work. Perhaps one of George Catlin’s finest and most recognizable portraits is that of Osceola, which accompanies this story as it hangs at the Smithsonian’s National Portrait Gallery. The adjacent card to this painting estimated Osceola was born around 1804, and died in 1838, the same year Catlin (1796-1872) put this oil to canvas. The National Portrait Gallery introduced this print with its explanation to the side, “The Seminole Indians of the Southeast were directly affected by Andrew Jackson’s policy of Indian removal, and although a portion of his tribe’s leadership gave in to the federal government, Osceola led the resistance. Unlike Black Hawk, who fought the Americans in the West, Osceola did not take on the U.S. military in open battle, but conducted a campaign of guerrilla warfare, harassing federal authorities from the Seminole base in the Everglades. Osceola was captured after the Americans violated a flag of truce. He died in prison shortly thereafter, but the Seminole, famously, never surrendered to the United States.”

History is often a mixture of the famous character, the one who told the story, and the one who recorded it. And that account is always interpreted years later by you, the reader. This interpretation occurs because of the foresight of wise people who have preserved culture such as writings and paintings. The dialogue and discourse that comes from this preservation continues at this time and is the best of U.S. democracy. Fitting, given Whitman’s poem was preserved as if it was unfinished.

The original works of Walt Whitman included this introduction to his poem “OSCEOLA,” which Whitman started in brackets to provide background. The italicized text below is Whitman’s work.

“[When I was nearly grown to manhood in Brooklyn, New York, (middle of 1838) I met one of the return’d U.S. Marines from Fort Moultrie, S. C., and had long talks with him – learn’d the occurrence below described – death of Osceola. The latter was a young, brave, leading Seminole in the Florida war of that time – was surrender’d to our troops, imprison’d and literally died of “a broken heart,” at Fort Moultrie. He sicken’d of his confinement – the doctor and officers made every allowance and kindness possible for him; then the close:]

“When his hour for death had come,  
*“He slowly rais’d himself from the bed on the floor,  
 “Drew on his war-dress, shirt, leggings, and girdled the belt around his waist,  
 “Call’d for vermilion paint (his looking-glass was held before him,)  
 “Painted half his face and neck, his wrists, and back-hands.  
 “Put the scalp-knife carefully in his belt – then lying down, resting a moment,  
 “Rose again, half sitting, smiled, gave in silence his extended hand to each and all,  
 “Sank faintly low to the floor (tightly grasping the tomahawk handle.)  
 “Fix’d his look on wife and little children – the last:  
 (And here a line in memory of his name and death.)”*

New events include community shopping on Friday and a community bonfire following the parade. A toy collection for needy Washington County families will replace the previous food drive.

The Washington County Planning, Conservation and Parks Committee will hold a public hearing on December 8 regarding allowing all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) on parts of the Eisenbahn Trail. If approved, ATVs would be allowed from December 15 to March 15, provided the trail is frozen and the temperature is 28 degrees or below. Approval is required from the PCPC and the municipalities of Kewaskum, Barton, and the Village of Kewaskum.

The Kewaskum School District recently revised its emergency response plan in light of the Marinette High School hostage situation. Superintendent Mike Krumm noted the high school practices lockdown drills. An advantage Kewaskum has is a liaison officer in the school at all times. The district has practiced evacuation drills with external agencies at the elementary schools.

#### December 7, 2000

Kewaskum's Fifth Annual Christmas Parade marched through the streets on Sunday, December 3, at 5 p.m., despite chilly temperatures. The event, sponsored by the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce, featured over 30 units and was capped off by Santa in the grand finale. Float winners were announced, with First Prize going to Kettle Moraine Sport Riders, Second to Kewaskum 4-H, and Third to Heberer Brothers Construction. A tree lighting ceremony was also held, with Sylvester Schmidt flipping the switch.

The Town of Scott Board approved a \$550,275 budget for 2001, resulting in a tax rate of \$3.53 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation. Pub-

lic discussion included concerns about competitive town salaries and "overkill" in fire protection with a call for departments to merge. Another change for the town is discontinuing the quest to sell recyclables due to the down market; instead, a contract was made with Superior Services, and residents will now co-mingle most recyclable materials.

The Fillmore Happy Hearts contributed \$500 toward the purchase of a defibrillator for Kewaskum High School, which costs approximately \$2800. The organization hopes the donation will inspire other community groups to contribute, recognizing that heart attacks can claim the lives of the young, often during athletic events. Donations can be made by contacting the school district, and because the district is a non-profit, donations may provide tax advantages.

Kewaskum Youth Scholarships, Inc. (KEYS) announced that 15 scholarships totaling \$55,700 will be awarded to the Kewaskum High School Class of 2001. This brings the total amount awarded by KEYS since 1986 to \$379,700. Two new memorial scholarships were added this year: the John "Spike" Schmitt Memorial Ride Scholarship and the William L. McCarty Memorial Scholarship. KEYS is a non-profit organization that relies on donations to continue providing this support for KHS graduates.

The Kewaskum girl's varsity basketball team defeated Random Lake in an exciting overtime win, 52-51, on Tuesday, Nov. 28. The game was close throughout, tied 26-26 at halftime. Key plays in the final minutes included Colleen Gosa taking a charge and later stealing the ball, and Heather Rieder sinking a jumper to secure the final lead with 15 seconds left. Rieder led the Indians with 17 points, followed by Gosa with 14 points, and Dani Nass with 13 points. A daughter, Olivia Marie, was born to Brian and Kim Spartz of Campbellsport on November 27. A daughter, Kristine Leean, was born to Jacqui and Kurt Gentz of Kewaskum on November 29.

### 50 Years Ago

#### December 5, 1975

The Kewaskum Village Board unanimously adopted the 1976 budget, set at \$1,167,422.21. The net tax rate is set at \$35.90 per \$1000 of valuation, an actual increase of \$2.00 over the prior year. The increase is largely attributed to a decrease in the value of manufacturing personal property by \$350,000 and a loss in expected state tax credits.

Henry Fick sold his insurance business, the H. W. Fick Agency, to Tom Bartelt, effective January 1, 1976. The agency has been in the Fick family since 1886. Bartelt, a Kewaskum native, recently moved back from Rosemount, MN. Henry Fick, who will celebrate his 80th birthday soon, will remain with the agency for the present, along with his secretary, Betty Ann Giese.

The Kiwanis students for November were Jill Zarling and Jack Kern. Jill, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Zarling, is the senior class president and National Honor Society member, active in multiple sports. Jack, son of Mr. and Mrs. Orville Kern, participates in football, basketball, track, and baseball, serving as class treasurer and Prom King.

The Kewaskum Indians basketball team was routed by West Bend East, 80-46, in their non-conference debut. The Indians held a 31-31 tie at half-time but lost control in the second half after the Suns applied a full court press. # The Journey Home and More Adventures

Hello everyone, this week I, Selina, am taking over the column to write about my most recent adventures. When I wrote to you last, I was sicker than a dog, and my summer was looking grim, but since then, things have turned around for me, and that's what I'm here to tell you about today!

Once my health recovered, I was able to return to my job as a snorkel technician with the state of Idaho to finish out the season. I spent my final two hitches (eight-day work trips) of the snorkel season near Stanley, Idaho, surveying fish underwater. I have been fortunate to have a variety of different technician jobs doing different kinds of work with fish, but I really wish that I could have had more time with this one specifically, because the feeling of being right in the water with the fish that you spend so much time studying, and observing them in their natural habitats is really incredible.

For our final hitch, we backpacked into alpine lakes to survey remote headwater streams with limited access other than by foot. We hiked over 30 miles in total, much of which included heavy packs from wet wetsuits as well as general camping gear. This hitch was exhausting but one of the greatest trips I've taken with incredible views, unique fish experiences, and lots of fun had and memories made with my other crew members.

Our "snorkel season" ended mid-August, and following that, my work primarily consisted of conducting spawning ground surveys for chinook salmon. These fish are born in tributary streams



of the Salmon River drainage and travel over 450 miles through the Columbia River system to the Pacific Ocean as juveniles and then make the return trip after a few years growing and maturing in the ocean to spawn in their natal (home/where they were born) stream. As they make their journey, they pass through a number of obstacles. Additionally, they stop feeding and rely on stored fats and their bodies start to literally fall apart. After this incredible journey, females will then locate the ideal place to dig their redds, where they scrape the bottom of their bodies and dig with their tail to build what looks similar to an underground nest to deposit their eggs, which will then be fertilized by males. These fish will only make this journey once; they look like zombie fish as they arrive, and they will die once they have spawned.

To track chinook populations over time, spawning ground surveys are completed by walking historic sites to search for redds, live salmon, and salmon carcasses. This often meant walking 2-7 miles in or adjacent to the stream to look for recently disturbed areas that may be redds/spawning sites or the fish themselves; it was kind of like a constant game of Where's Waldo. Prior to this job, I had never worked with salmon, and it was awe-inspiring to get to witness firsthand the journey that they make and the resilience that they have to hold on with so much adversity facing them.

On top of spawning ground surveys, I assisted in a variety of other monitoring efforts, including working at rotary screw traps, raft and backpack electrofishing, fish salvages, and got to do some environmental education. It was great to return to working in the field after my last office-based position and get more hands-on experience to fuel my fire towards fisheries conservation.

For the time being, I am unemployed, living my best life off the little bit of savings I've built up, doing lots of hunting and spending some much-

needed time with my family. I am super excited for my near future, though, as I will be heading to New Zealand for a month over December and through my birthday! It will be their summer, and I'll be road tripping and backpacking throughout the North and South Island, exploring the country. This will be my first big international trip, and I cannot wait to take in the beauty New Zealand has to offer. Following my trip, I'll be returning to Montana to put in as many ski days as possible and then hopefully starting grad school in the late spring or fall!


